



One of our biggest racing events is the Midwinter Regatta, which occurs annually over a 2-day period in February. This event is sponsored by SCYA and hosted by

one or more yacht clubs in each region -- from our area all the way to San Diego. We are the host for the entire ASBCYC region as well as regional J-24s. This year's event was well-attended -- both on the water and in the bar! Our PRO, Bill Brayton, did a great job managing 6 races for the J-24 fleet (including a couple of restarts) and 5 races each for the Spinnaker A/B and Non-Spinnaker classes! Twenty boats entered and raced both days, including boats from Santa Barbara and Mission Viejo. The winds were light and the temperature was near 80° on Saturday; Sunday was a little more lively and cooler.

Bill's Race Committee team included Commodore Tom Warden, Cindy Arosteguy, and me, as well as Don Dickey, Jim Lovins, Kitty Frallic, and Tina Brayton. I sincerely want to acknowledge and thank CIYC boat owners Frank Sullivan, Don Dickey, and Skip Miser, for piloting their boats and letting us use them for the Race Committee and mark setting platforms. Mark Boat crew included Tim Haapanen, Mike Smith, Bob Deyling, and Cary Verstynen. Additionally, Tom and Cary welcomed the early racers prior to the Skippers Meeting, and helped them with registration at CIYC, while Mary Foster, Mary Howard, and I joined Bill at VYC for a special Skippers Meeting for the J-24s only. Mary Howard managed the shirt and cap sales at both Skippers Meetings as well as at the awards. (Mary F and Mary H also raced both days!)

SCYA Judges Richard and Susan Countess (PBYC), who were present both days, were great resources for scoring and rules questions. SCYA Representative Martha Jean Gieszler joined us for the Skippers Meeting, as well as post race both days; she joined Bill in presenting the awards to the winners. The number of attendees for the race awards outgrew the bar and moved to the dining room. The boats in the Spinnaker A fleet placed the same over 5 separate windward-leeward races; VYC's RIVAL (with our Chris Williams as crew) won every race; TROUBLEMAKER (Rod Abbott, Roxanne Vettese) was second, and GRACE (Bob & Sherry Heatherly with Harry Krum, Curt Ingram, Mary Howard, Dave Lochridge, Larry Golkin and George Fitch as crew) took third. The only CIYC boat in the Spinnaker B fleet, ZOARCES (Shelly Johnson with Mary Foster and Charlie Clark among the crew) got third place; CIYC's Non-Spinnaker entry, VELERO (Brent Swanson), finished in second place.

On the hospitality side, Chris Williams organized a get-together Friday night before the race, with potluck items from CIYC races. Additionally, Vice Commodore Keith Moore, First Mate Mary Ann Moore and crews served chili for the pre-race get-together, breakfast for the Skippers Meeting Saturday morning and hamburgers and hot dogs for the racers and awards Sunday afternoon.

However, the biggest event of the weekend was not on the water at all. **Our Mardi Gras social** – the first social in 2013 - was a huge success! **Frank Laza's authentic Cajun cooking**, including spicy and not-so-spicy options, was the perfect fit with **Curt Ingram's vintage jazz and blues band**, the <u>'Barrelhouse Wailers'</u>.

# Anglers' Corner

# **Rockfish Season begins March 1<sup>st</sup> 2013**

Here are some changes in the DFW (Department of Fish and Wildlife) Rules for 2013 that  $\bigotimes$  are of concern to our area:

# Kelp Bass, Barred Sand Bass, Spotted Sand Bass (effective March 1, 2013)

1) New size limit: at least 14 inches total length or 10 inches alternate length

2) New daily bag limit: up to 5 fish in any combination of species

# Filleting of Fish on Vessels (effective March 1, 2013)

1) Kelp bass, barred sand bass, spotted sand bass: Fillets must be at least  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches long and retain a 1 inch square patch of skin.

(2) Ocean whitefish: Fillets must be at least  $6\frac{1}{2}$  inches long and retain the entire skin, intact.

# The Southern Groundfish Management Area depth limit will remain 50 fm in 2013.

(1) Shelf rockfish (as defined in CCR Title 14, Section 1.91(a)(3) may now be retained in CCAs, except no cowcod or bronze-spotted, yellow-eye, or canary rockfish may be taken or possessed.

(3) 2) The daily limit for kelp greenling and rock greenling has increased from three fish to 10 fish in combination, statewide, within the Rockfish-Cabezon-Greenling (RCG) Complex sub-bag limit of 10 fish total.

3) The daily limit for Boccaccio has increased from two fish to three fish, statewide, within the RCG Complex sub-bag limit of 10 fish total, and the Boccaccio size limit is eliminated.

## No big fish were reported for February; remember turn in your fish to win the \$50 big fish of the month award.

WSB: I'm still waiting for contact from Hubs research to let us know about the next shipment of fry for the grow-out pens.



# Doc Lines

# To E- OR NOT TO E-

Australia recently proposed legislation to license smokers. Just like cars. Send money to the DMV and, presto, you can buy and smoke cigarettes. Oregon is considering legislation to classify nicotine as a Class III drug (the same class as anabolic steroids), so that the only way to buy a cig would be by obtaining a prescription from your doc. Good luck with that! Starting Jan. 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014, Obamacare will allow health insurers to charge smokers up to 50% higher premiums. 

# Sea Water Bread

About 35 years ago Virginia found a wonderful recipe for sea water bread in Robin Grahams book "Dove", and we enjoyed the bread so many times while cruising the Islands, and Ports of California and Mexico that we thought we would share the recipe with our friends at Channel Islands Yacht Club.

One tablespoon of dried yeast, one tablespoon of sugar, four cups of flour, one and a half cups of sea water.

Dissolve the yeast and sugar in the sea water, then mix in the flour. Put in a well-greased heavy pan. Let it stand for two hours to rise. Cook, covered, on top of stove for a half hour on a low flame, turn bread over, and cook for an additional half hour-Enjoy!
