Message From The Commodore Larry Golkin

We will have a **board meeting** on **June 4th** and a board meeting in July along with a luncheon.


Hope this article finds you all well and recuperated from Opening Day. I'm on my way.

WSB pen Update:

We will soon begin collecting the Brood stock. We will need to ask that anglers wishing to participate follow some guidelines for handling the fish. We will ask CIYC private boaters to make prior arrangements with us to get access to the pens. Here are some handling techniques provided by Hub Sea World Research:

Handling Procedures for White Seabass Broodstock Collection

The guidelines presented below are designed to reduce handling stress and increase survivorship in fish that are caught by angling which will be kept alive and used to supplement the current captive spawning broodstock in the aquaculture program at Hubbs-SeaWorld Research Institute.

Recommended Tackle

Circle Hooks Reduce Hook Damage & Subsequent Mortality Rates

It is preferred that circle hooks (4/0 to 8/0) be used when fishing for fish that will eventually become breeders in the hatchery. This hook type is preferred over J-hooks because it tends to hook fish in the jaw more frequently and reduces hooking mortality. Fishing with barbless hooks by flattening the barb on the hook will minimize injury to the fish and facilitate easier hook removal.

Land the Fish Quickly

To reduce exhaustion and stress in the fish it is best to reel the fish in swiftly without overpowering your equipment. This is best accomplished by using heavier tackle with a tighter drag setting.

40-50 Lb. Test Line Is Effective In Bringing In A Fish Through Kelp

Another option is to use braided line (40-50 lbs.) attaching a 3-8 ft. leader of (30-40 lb.) fluorocarbon and using a tighter drag than you would if fishing monofilament. This combination is more abrasion resistant and will cut through kelp better than monofilament. This setup will help to land fish quicker thereby reducing stress and injury on the fish.

Bringing Fish Onboard Your Boat

A Knotless Mesh Net Should be Used to Remove Fish from the Water

It is strongly recommended that a knotless fine mesh net (<1/2 inch square openings) be used because it is less abrasive and minimizes slime and scale loss in addition to reducing fin entanglement in the net which can split the fins. Since the external mucous layer of the fish is one of its primary defense mechanisms against invasion of pathogens, maintaining its integrity is critical to the fish's health and survival. Do not lift the fish out of the water using only fishing tackle, gaff or by grabbing the mouth. A knotless, wide mouth, fine mesh net should be used and slid under the fish while it is still in the water. Gently lift the fish out of the water and onto the boat being careful not to hit the fish against the side of the boat or the gunwale. While the fish is in the net it should not be laid on the deck of the boat and the hook should be removed at this time (See hook removal instructions below). The fish should not remain in air for more than one minute and it should be transferred into the holding tank as soon as possible (See placing fish into the holding tank below).

Smooth Rubber or Latex Gloves Should be Worn

Using gloves will help protect both the handler and the fish. Actual physical "handling" should be kept to a minimum if done at all. Never insert hands under the operculum and into the gill cavity to lift the fish. This can lead to injury and hemorrhaging at the gill filaments. In addition, avoid grabbing the fish around the tail. Fish that have come into the hatchery after being handled poorly have a high incidence of bacterial infection and may eventually need to be euthanized.

Hook Removal

Remove Hooks Carefully with Needle-Nose Pliers or Cut the Line

Keep the fish in the net while removing the hook as this will aid in controlling the fish should it "kick". If it is difficult to remove the hook and the barbed end is visible then cut off this end and remove the hook. Alternatively, if the barb is not visible then the shank of the hook should be cut and the barbed end left place. Eventually the remaining portion of the hook will fall out or it will be removed at a later date when the fish is anesthetized. If the hook is deep in the throat of the fish or it is not visible, then cut the fishing line as close to the hook as possible. At any point during hook removal the fishing line should not be pulled in an attempt to locate the hook or free it from the fish.





Perform this Procedure Using Only the Apparatus and Instructions Provided

To vent a fish with a hyperinflated air bladder, please read the handout on <u>White Seabass Air Bladder Deflation</u> **CAREFULLY**. It is best to perform this procedure just after the fish has been placed in the holding tank and ONLY if it is observed to be floating upside down and unable to right itself.

Placing Fish into the Holding Tank

Be Attentive When Placing Fish into the Holding Tank

The holding tank should be smooth and free of rough or sharp protrusions that can cause injury or remove scales from the fish if they come in contact with them. If the fish is in a net, then place the whole net into the tank and gently turn the net upside down and allow the fish to swim out of the net. Carefully assist the fish out of the net if needed. If the net frame is too large to fit into the tank then place the net as close as possible to the tank with the fish's head near the tank opening. Grab the netting and pull it taught and help roll the fish out of the net while guiding it, head first, into the tank. Be careful not to let the fish touch sharp edges or protrusions (latches, screws, etc.) that may be in close proximity to the tank opening. If the fish is in a sling then place the end of the sling with the fish's head into the tank and raise the back end allowing the fish to slide out of the sling, head first, into the tank.

Underway

Frequently Monitor the Fish and Holding Tank

It is important that the holding tank not be overloaded with fish in order to provide adequate room for movement and well oxygenated seawater to the fish. The holding tank should be covered to prevent water loss and reduce "sloshing" and also prohibit the fish from jumping out of the tank. While underway periodically inspect the holding tank to make sure that seawater is flowing through the tank and that the fish appear in good condition and are not incurring further injury.
