thanking us for our great hospitality and the hard work of our Port Captains, Bob Deyling and Bill Cline. He also mentioned the tireless help they received from Vice Commodore Larry Golkin and the Race Committee crew that started the race.

As I write this the final preparation are in progress for the 30th Anniversary Olsen 30's National regatta. This "ALL HANDS ON DECK!!" effort should solidify our reputation as a serious Yacht Club and the "friendliest Yacht Club on the coast". By the time you receive this Currents article, the painting of the exterior of the Club should be well underway or completed. There is no doubt it will be a marked improvement over the look to the exterior of the building. The interior design committee has begun meetings and should have a plan that can be perused to paint and re-carpet the interior of the building. Some minor repairs and painting may take place quickly, however the major maintenance issues will be addressed as soon as we receive authorization from the Club to expend the funds from the Building Fund.

Between the cost of living increases over the past few years and the increase in rent that will occur some time this year we will propose a dues increase to take effect next year. Board members are working diligently on this issue and will be bringing it to the membership in a timely manner. It has been a few years since the last increase and we are falling behind in our ability to cover our costs.

#### Club News Update

The Club recently upgraded to a new credit card vendor. A new benefit for members eliminates the need for keeping credit card information in the office. Effective immediately, all members can swipe their VISA, MasterCard, American Express or Discover card at the bar.

Bar sales will be processed through the bar cash register as always. Dinner and Ship's Locker sales will be processed through a second terminal next to the bar cash register.

We encourage all members to take advantage of this new benefit. If for some reason, you don't have your credit card with you and you have your credit card info on file in the office, your sale will be manually processed. Conversely, no new credit card info forms will be accepted.

**Please note:** Effective August 15, 2008, all credit card sales (Bar, Dinner and Ship's Locker) will only be processed with a credit card at the bar.





# Message From The Vice Commodore Larry Golkin



#### My Dear Friends:

This year, we lost a certain amount of ground in terms of the redevelopment of the outside of our building. Many of us have suffered the misfortune of losing friends and fellow club members.

Some of our fellows have suffered injury or disability, or have undergone surgery. We haven't seen the sun in what seems like weeks; and that, after a blistering hot spell. All year the weather has been described as capricious and the forecasts have been finicky at best. There's a nasty green slime on the water emanating from the back of the harbor that seems to cover the rocks bringing incessant flies. The price of fuel is getting out of hand and our leaders don't seem to care. So, the cost of everything is hiking exponentially as a direct result. Sounds pretty grim, doesn't it. Sounds like all hell is breaking loose and there is nothing we can do to stem the tide of misery flooding right into our own back yards. The glass is half empty. Six of one.

Another perspective involves the story of a platoon of marines, cut off from their comrades, surrounded by a pissed off, well supplied enemy, out numbered, without food or water, buried in the mud in a steaming hot jungle, far from home, and running low on ammo. They, however, never gave up hope, and were determined to fight their way out. Not only did they make it out, alive to fight another day, but as soon as the dust cleared, they requested permission from their commanders to join another platoon and to continue bringing the fight to the enemy. Bravery, courage under fire, and stout loyalty enabled them to endure long enough to make it out. The glass is half full. Half dozen of another.

In nature, monotony and homogeneity are the markers of extinction soon coming. The rules of survival and evolution dictate that we must diversify and adapt at the same time; to flow with this endemic tide, and to swim out of it when the opportunity presents itself. This requires that we adapt to, improvise with, and overcome change. The first thing that has to change, however, is our outlook. Is our glass half full or is it half empty? Abreojos lead the way, having been the first to leave the harbor. As we approached the east end of Santa Cruz, the wicked windy lane decided to blow real hard; unusually hard for 0840. Try as we might to get into the lee of the island and look for calmer conditions, before rounding Potato Point to make the last leg to Prisoners, it was just not to be. After taking the second "greenie" over the roof, we decided to head for cover at Yellow Banks. When we got there, we were treated to some of the finest weather all year. Moreover, all the boats in our loosely organized flotilla figured it out as well and came around the east end. So, as they say, if you make a plan and God laughs, you simply make another plan. So we did.

Later that afternoon, a down canyon wind came up something fierce. The temperature seemed to go over 100F. Everyone scurried back to their boats and hunkered down for what could have lasted until very late in the evening. There was a viscous sense of fear in the air. Boats not properly anchored or without appropriate ground tackle were dragging right out of the anchorage. But then, after almost an hour, the wind completely died, and an almost eerie calm befell the anchorage. The sun came back out, and the water turned mirror-like. Then, out of nowhere, came the sound of a someone blowing on a conch shell. The deep hollow sound echoed across the water. Within a couple seconds, the palatable trepidation of those who were stiffened by the frightening wind, relaxed and nearly every other boat in the anchorage responded by sounding their horns or bells. It was as if every person breathed a collective sigh of relief at the wind's demise. This went on for 2 minutes, and then stopped as suddenly as it started. Silence prevailed once again, but this time, the sounds of happiness and good times filled in. It was an exceptionally moving experience.

So, with this article, I am blowing my conch shell, and I invite you to all sound your horns in solidarity and strength, for it is only by viewing our situation through these lenses that we, as a family, will enjoy our inevitable evolution.


Each and every one of you worked together and, like a well oiled machine, we did an impressive job.

is awarded at the end of every month...however; you can only win once per year. Legal fin fish only and no sharks.


#### "Big Fish of the Year"

#### WEATHER;

Hello

Our coastal weather has been great with the changing prevailing winds beginning to change to the Southwest. By the time you receive this column we will be in full offshore boating season. Remain cautious an occasional hard westerly will come thru usually less predictable as in the winter and spring months and can be quite localized.

Recently a boater left Ventura harbor with great weather on the coast only to spend the next 12 hours in total misery trying to hold anchor in multiple anchorages and having to cross the channel in rough seas. There is no time of the year one can leave the dock without using all the technical weather reports available via the Internet and national and local news media.

September, we will be subject to the most dangerous weather I believe one can encounter known as the Santa Ana Winds or Northeasterly Windstorm. Bottom line keep a close watch on your trip's weather forecast.

#### FISHING;

Fishing has been terrific with the Thresher Shark fishing being the hot bite. We have been consistently boating fish in the 40 to 100 pound class with an occasional catch being in the 150 to 200 pound range. The larger sharks have been biting the leaders off due to chaffing during the hour plus fight. We probably need to go up on size of leader material to 200 pound test Mono versus 125 pound test leaders.

Most of our catches have been on sardines being drifted with balloons above.

We have also experienced running out of strength before we can get the shark boated. I do suggest if you are going to try fishing these hard fighters get a rod belt and pre set the buckle to fit the angler prior to hooking up. I acutely like to mark my beat with a marker pin so belt can be secured quickly. The bigger fish 150 pounds and up require a shoulder harness which clips to both sides of the reel and spreads the pressure of the rod pulling to your upper back and shoulders. With both these in use you can literally take your hands off the reel and rod and rest from time to time. Another important part of fishing shark, like all fish you catch, is the preservation of the cache to eat. I have been out on several of my customers boats and have found they are not taking enough ice to cool out the catch. Each shark kept for 6 hours are going to require 20 to 30 pounds of ice to chill fish. With this in mind if you plan to take a full limit of sharks i.e. two a piece you should take 80-120 pounds of ice. Simply pour 2 inches of ice in the bottom of your fish box or large cooler, lay cleaned shark in and cover rest of shark with ice. I like to add a couple of quarts of ocean water to the top to keep the cooling temperature spread evenly. I have always believed keeping a fish on the swim step after catching ruins the fish to eat.

#### **BOATS AND YACHTS;**

It seems half the talk when consulting with buyers of a boat is fuel consumption. Boats have always been heavy fuel burners especially the faster models. I read an article recently in which it mentioned you could realize a 15% reduction in fuel consumption simply by stabilizing your boat. This is a 20-30K up-grade to most boats in the 35-50 foot range. While one may say the cost to fuel savings is very impractical, you need to look at the other benefit which is 60% reduction of rolling motion underway. I think the fuel savings is a bonus full spectrum. Also fine tuning you prop to the new cruising speeds you are now traveling will give you anther 5 to 10% reduction of fuel consumption. Now we are at a 20 to 25% savings level. Keeping your boat 3 to 5 years, I say it a good investment.

#### **VESSEL SAFETY CHECKS**

The Vessel Safety Check is a complimentary check of your boat conducted by members of the Auxiliary, confirming that it meets both federal and state requirements for safety. No citations are issued and the results of the safety check are not reported to any enforcement agency, but a decal is awarded to display if the vessel has passed the examination.

An example of some of the items checked include:

# VESSEL SAFETY CHECK

- Personal Flotation Devices (life jackets)
- Registration and numbering
- Navigation lights
- Ventilation
- Fire extinguishers
- Distress signals (flares, horn, etc.)
- Battery cover and connections

All of these items are currently required by state and federal laws and, if missing or non-operating, can result in a citation if your vessel is inspected by the Coast Guard.

The Vessel Safety Check gives you a risk-free way to check that you meet the legal minimums and to potentially avoid a citation later.





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
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
