Angler's Corner Frank Sullivan

Angler's dues of \$10 for the 2009 fishing season are now due. Please send in your dues with your regular club dues billing. If you forgot and sent it in without the angler's dues, you can provide a SEPARATE check made out to Channel Islands Yacht Club and



put Angler's Club in the memo section of the check and send it to the Club.

We intend for this to be an exciting and fun-filled year. If you are a current member, you know the drill but, for those of you who are new and may want to join in the fun, here are the details:

For only ten bucks, you will have a distinctive looking fish next to your name in the CIYC roster; participate in the Club's Tournaments, be eligible for the \$50 Big Fish of the Month Award, as well as the \$100 Big Fish of the Year Award.

Many months go by when no, or few fish are weighed in which means that the ¹/₄ lb mack may be worth \$50, so weigh him in! An Angler can only win once a year so we should have 12 different winners.

Angler's Club funds have, in the past, been used for projects around the Yacht Club, for the betterment of our fishing experience, and to support the White Seabass grow-out pens in the harbor.

Last year the Anglers donated \$1000 towards the Dining Room Remodel and purchased a stand alone back-up hard drive for the Club's computers.

This year I am soliciting ideas from the members on how to improve the services of the Angler's Club. In April, we will again start our meetings on the third Thursday of the month in conjunction with the Channel Islands Anglers (CIA). We will have speakers on fishing techniques and fisheries issues. This is not a formal meeting but a time to share fishing stories and brag about the big one that didn't get away. We will continue with it this year. Please enclose a note indicating your interest or any other ideas to benefit the welfare of the Club.

If you wish to join this elite group please respond by January 30th so we can put the fish logo by your name in the CIYC Roster.

WSB grow-out pen update:

Some time in February we should get this year's first batch of juvenile White Sea Bass for the pens. When we get them they are usually only about 3 to 4 inches long. When released, the fish are often 7 to 12 inches long. The purpose of this program is to replenish the ocean stock. Once released, it takes 4 to 5 years for the fish to reach the legal take limit of 28 inches. Each fish has a hidden coded wire tag embedded in its right gill plate. The tag is detected by a magnetic sensing device when the heads are turned in to collection stations. The guys from Hubbs-Sea World Institute said they are having a hard time getting folks to turn in the WSB heads from their catches especially from the charters, so please insist that the deckies lop of their heads and turn them in for the Hubbs research. We need the information we gain from these returns.

Although the hatchery supplies the 11 grow-out pens from Channel Islands Harbor to San Diego with fish, food, nets, and technical assistance, the labor is provided by volunteers. Labor consists of unloading fish when delivered, filling the feeders (about every 2 days), scooping out the dead fish and checking for disease, recording mortality, checking the bird net and predator net, maintaining the pens, and releasing the fish under the direction of the hatchery coordinator. Currently all the volunteers that handle the Channel Islands Harbor grow-out pens are members of the Channel Islands Yacht Club, Anglers.

Historian

Being around **CIYC** for a number of years, one observes and participates in various events to be remembered with a smile or at least a snicker. Early on, some of the club events that currently occur within the confines of the clubhouse were held at various alternate venues, such as local restaurants, private homes and at beach and marina locations. In addition, members had other outings that resulted in bonding of participants. These outings included events such as cruises, ski trips, rodeos, park picnics, RV trips and others.

As the year unfolds, I will try to relate information relative to activities from the clubhouse and alternate locations as I remember them and from other sources, such as photos, early Currents, rumor and wherever info turns up.

A quick look at **CIYC**

My first experience with **CIYC** was during the 1971-1972 time period. I had a boat berthed on C dock just in front of the CIYC clubhouse and was aboard most weekends. Friends would invite me to dinner at the club. As I remember, the clubhouse was small, the kitchen was outside on the ground floor and separated from the upstairs meeting room. The meeting room was maybe 30' by 50' feet with a small bar in the same room. The dining area had narrow tables and folding chairs. The area where the current bar is located was an outside deck. The kitchen was basically where the downstairs kitchen is currently located; the sides of the kitchen building had hinged panels that folded up to the ceiling above the food serving counters. When the food 'ready bell' rang, the diners would go down the stairs to the kitchen, pick up their food and silverware and take it up to the dinning area. Great fun.

Prior to the clubhouse being built in the early 70's, the founding members of the club were busy trying to organize and get a Yacht Club started. These early members had original meetings in a building located on the Wharf in Port Hueneme. These folks got the job done and named it, **CHANNEL ISLAND YACHT CLUB**.

The club was incorporated in 1960. The members had great foresight by picking the name as well as starting a yacht club several years before Channel Islands Harbor was constructed. The **CIYC** burgee was selected from a design by Greg Beisel who passed away in 1975. We have a lot of very thoughtful people to thank for helping us to get to where we are today.

Several years later, Phyllis and I moved to the beach at Silverstrand and again we were invited to attend functions at CIYC. In the time since our earlier exposure to CIYC, many changes had been made. The clubhouse had been built-out to almost its current configuration with a separate Bar room, fireplace room, upstairs kitchen, and other upgrades for the enjoyment of the members. Following 2 or 3 visits we were able to join the club in 1980 and hopefully have contributed to the welfare of the club since.

Another internal clubhouse refurbishment was accomplished in 1987 as a member do-it-yourself project. The members added carpet, paint, bathrooms and some new chairs and tables for the Bar and Dining Room. Other improvements were also included to really spiffy up the clubhouse. It was really a fun effort as many members pitched in to help.

As 2008 comes to an end, CIYC is very busy celebrating the Holidays, the Parade of Lights, News Years Eve, and the completion of the much needed complete interior refurbishment of the clubhouse. This effort includes electrical, acoustics for the ceiling and walls, floor coverings, paint, and much more. Completion of this project resulted in a beautiful and colorful clubhouse for members to experience for many years to come.

NOTE- several years ago the Parade of Lights was a function of **CIYC** and PCYC. Each club organized and managed the entire Parade on alternating years. Eventually, the local business owners assumed control of the Parade of Lights operation.

Hello Boaters and Waterfront Lovers

WEATHER

Our weather seems to be changing to winter quickly. With the rain storms, we will also receive the high pressure from the desert which can produce the Santa Ana conditions. Be sure to pay close attention to weather advisories during months leading up to March. I move to the 210 boating plan about this time each year which is planning all my boating from 210 degrees compass to the West. This allows me to most always have a down swell condition coming home condition which makes for a nice ending to each trip. Going east of 210 degrees will put you in risk of getting caught in high winds and seas on your bow which can be very uncomfortable. If you happen to get caught south of Mugu Rock/Point Dume in very heavy seas consider setting course to Marina Del Rey until the winds calm.

Also be aware of heavy surf breaks near the Santa Clara River mouth. Stay offshore at least one mile and, when approaching the entrance to Ventura Harbor, steer to the large entrance approach buoy and set your course through the channel entry. If the entrance is breaking, proceed to Channel Islands Harbor for a safe alternative. If you feel you want to enter regardless, approach the West jetty close and slow until you are getting close to the breaking swells, next take a few minutes and count the sets meaning swells come ashore in groups of four or five to a set. Between each set is a flat space that is equal in distance to a set. After watching a couple of sets and getting your timing down, wait for the next set to come and ride the back side of the last swell at full throttle thru the entrance to the safety of the inner harbor. You probably won't do this more than once after considering the risk you just took.

FISHING

Our summer fishing has stopped with the colder waters. Reports from member John Korner show that he has been catching some nice rockfish in the areas between Anacapa and Santa Cruz Island. Catch him at the club watering hole for details of tackle and GPS numbers.

Other than that, we are trying to locate the best area for clamming. Silverstrand Beach has all but quit producing. Maybe next month we will have found them and be able to give out good information. This a great time to fish Surf Perch. A relatively easy fish to catch and requires no boat. Simply purchase a rod and reel that you can cast say 40 feet with ease. I use a spinning reel in the10 to 15 pound class size and spool up 8 pound test. This allows me plenty of line to cast and you get more distance with the larger reel spool allowing the line off the reel faster than a small spool. Next string the line through the rod guides pulling enough out to a the reel end of the rod for easy handling while tying on hooks and sinkers. Next take a 3/4 ounce egg sinker and slip it onto your line. Take a small #8 barrel swivel and tie it on the bitter end of the line which will stop the sinker from sliding off the line. Next take a 3 foot piece of four pound test leader line and tie it onto the opposite end of the swivel. Now tie a number 6 barbed hook directly to the end of the leader. Bait will be a plastic grub about 1 1/2 inch long and root beer in color. Simply cast out 30-40 feet and reel enough to keep slack line taunt and watch the tip of the rod for bites. Some of these perch will go up to 2 pounds and fillet out make great battered fish and chip fish.

PROTOCOL

Protocol isn't just "Miss Manners" but as the Fiddler on the Roof would say it's our "TRADITION". As a yacht club, we draw our traditions from the Navy's of the world, other yacht clubs and of course we make many of our own.

One of the important traditions is **Change of Watch**. This is the ceremony in which the change of power/ responsibility occurs. For CIYC, this happens during a couple of events. We have a Change of Watch dinner at which we recognize the outgoing Bridge (Commodore, Vice Commodore, and Rear Commodore) and the Directors. We then acknowledge our new Bridge, Directors and Flag Officers. The Flag Officers are the 3 commodores, Secretary, Treasurer, Port Captain, Fleet Captain, Fleet Surgeon, Judge Advocate, and Chaplin. Change of Watch has been held both in December and in January. But no matter when the ceremony happens the actual "Change of Watch" or the change in responsibilities happens at 12:01AM, January 1st, New Year's Eve.

Attire for Change of Watch is traditionally club attire for the men and Cocktail dresses for the women. But don't stay away if you haven't found a blue blazer yet. A suit or sports jacket is fine.

For the new members, when you hear "club attire", we mean your blue blazer with bullion (the club patch), white shirt and depending on the time of year, white or gray slacks/skirts. When do we change from gray to white? The two dates to remember are: **Opening Day**, we go from gray to white and **Labor Day**, when we go back to gray.

Another of our January traditions is the Commodore's Cruise. Please make sure you are there!


