Please join us in congratulating our new Commodore Officers for 2008!









As we move into the holiday season, the racing year is complete. At the time of press, there is just one race left that counts for Ventura County High Points. The final race of the Two Harbors

Fall Series will have been won and lost by the time you read this. But enough about that!

## **Two Harbors Fall Series**

The Fall series races number two and three were fiercely contested during October and November. In race two there was total confusion about the now infamous course 18 which said, leave Gina to port



before proceeding to Gail, when it really meant starboard.

Most boats did the right thing and rounded the Port way by circling the rig completely. One wag didn't and sailed straight to Gail, getting himself disqualified in the process. Winds were very light and the Olsons were soon showing why they are feared in light winds as well as heavy. They were keeping up with most of the A boats, although they were in B fleet.

The heavier A boats were led by *Rival*, that always hard to beat J35, showing a clean pair of heels to our own *Funatic* and new comer *Maine Squeeze* sailed by Mike Taylor. Their finish in Ventura harbor was helped by the freshening winds that arrived in mid afternoon. However the same winds deserted the B fleet leader *Perfect Balance* right in the entrance to the harbor.

She sat there for 15 minutes while the other B boats caught her up. The well sailed J29 Coyote from AYC sailed into 1<sup>st</sup> place, *Perfect Balance* just holding on to her 2<sup>nd</sup> place from her arch nemesis, *Bikini Machine* who brought the returning wind with them.

The Non Spinnaker fleet sailed a 10 mile course, painfully slow and frustrating in those light winds with only *Quiet Times* managing to finish. Our own *Velero* and *Zuma Jay* would have to wait for another day to do battle in their long standing rivalry.

The third Fall series race saw all classes sail an 18 mile course, again starting in light winds. Olsons in front again at the beginning, so everything normal there! *Perfect Balance*, again showing the way in light air, was soon to suffer from being under crewed when the wind rose to 14 knots on the way to Gail.

Bikini Machine passed her as she had to change from a #1 to a #3. The A class boats were now starting to get into their stride and the new Flying Tiger, Ruckus was hard on the heels of Deception and Funatic. All the A boats had suffered in the early part of the race, but Ruckus did best coming first with Deception just behind and only one minute in front of Funatic. Maine Squeeze beat No Compromise who brought up the rear.

The B class boats were so dominant in the light air that the first three, *Bikini Machine*, *Perfect Balance* and *Coyote* all beat the corrected times of the A fleet. Bigger surprises were in store however as Kevin Dickmann (*Zuma Jay*) sailed the 11 mile course in great form, beating his long time rival *Velero* for line honors in the five boat non spin fleet.

## **Guy and Gal Series**

Changeable conditions were the order of the day for the long awaited (postponed twice) two handed series. In the first two races, the wind at times reaching 20 knots. This is a tough race, especially for the bigger boats that have heavy sails to handle.

Our Roxanne Vitess and Rod Abbott sailing Funatic gained a 5th and 3<sup>rd</sup> places to keep them in the hunt for silverware, however in the final race on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> November the winds deserted altogether and Funatic could manage only a 4<sup>th</sup> place giving her a fifth place overall.

One of the prestigious trophies of the racing year is the Ventura High Points. This arcane scoring system gives one point for every boat that you beat in a race. Therefore, the more races you enter, the more points you are capable of earning. Of course, you have to beat other boats to get points, not just turn up.

This year, *Bikini Machine* from Ventura Yacht Club is a clear winner with 140 points at the time of printing, followed by her rival *Perfect Balance* with 108 points and our own *Funatic* with 87 points. At this late stage, these places will not change, although the total points will. Congratulations to *Funatic* and *Perfect Balance* crews for surviving a very long season and helping their skippers sail to success for CIYC.

*Velero* came home with 62 points, *Zuma Jay* with 42, *West Wing* 36, *Scooter* 30, *Harmony* 23, and *Fifty One-Fifty* 23. CIYC again packs the top of the leader board with 5 boats in the first 11 places. Well done all CIYC racers.

So now, at the end of our season, thoughts turn to new sails, hauling out, new hull work, shrinking bank balances and hard work for the off season. Hopefully all our racers will be able to recharge their batteries and be ready to start a new racing year at the end of January.

## First There is Cold . . . Then There is Really Cold

Generally, the water in our Channel is cold and it is not unusual to find temperatures averaging in the low 50's. And when you fall into water that cold, your body is going to react.

The first thing that happens is an involuntary gasp when your body hits the water and it realizes just how cold the water is. That gasp can fill your lungs with water and make you as heavy as a rock. And as everyone knows, rocks don't float very well.

Then you will begin to hyperventilate, causing panic among other things. Your heart rate can skyrocket. And that's only in the first minute!

Over the next 10 minutes or so, you will begin to lose the ability to move your limbs which will have a direct effect on your ability to swim to safety. Things will go rapidly downhill from there. And if you are not wearing a lifejacket it won't be long before you go down as well.



But there are simple steps you can take when you're boating in cold weather and the water is cold-

First, wear your lifejacket. It can save your life! The lifejacket guar-

antees that you will float, even if you inhale a lung full of cold water. Of course, that means having it on before you fall in!

Some lifejackets, like floater jackets will also provide insulation, too. When your body is in cold water, heat loss is the greatest threat as the minutes tick by. Wearing a lifejacket means you don't have to exert yourself trying to stay afloat, which is a sure way to lose heat and lessen your survival chances and rescue time.

Today's lifejackets are modern marvels. Some can be worn in a belt

pack around your waist, ready to inflate the instant it senses water. Others are a collar worn over your shoulders: one tug and it inflates in a split second. A floater coat can help preserve vital body heat in cold water as it keeps you floating, and there are also full length survival suits that protect you against the worst of elements.



Whatever your boating style, whenever you boat, think about the water temperature and conditions and prepare for them by having the proper life-jacket and by wearing it. It will help you stay afloat, stay warm and stay alive.

This is the last boating safety article of 2007. Next year, commencing in January, look for the Sunday Boating Safety Seminar Series. One Sunday each month, between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 7 p.m., one of our club members, or an invited guest, will present discussion topics on various boating safety topics and hold discussion. We all have a lot to learn, and a lot to remember, as we prepare for the next boating season. Check the calendar and plan to attend.

## Dave Wilhite's Report

## **Happy Holiday's Boaters and Waterfront Lovers**

## WEATHER

We are experiencing a typical fall coastal season. We sure could use some rainfall to assure we will have ample runoff of nutrients for the bottom of the food ocean to replenish. We have had only two mild to hard Santa Ana's and light prevailing weather to November 10 which is a great late fall.

Keep in mind usually when we have a dry mid to late fall we could see Santa Ana's as late a February. Keep a close watch on weather reports before looking for Santa Ana warnings.

## **FISHING**

Fishing at all thee Rockfish spots has been very good with limits being reported. Halibut and White Sea Bass are starting to show up at Santa Rosa Island in good numbers.

I recently was asked buy a client what do we fish in and around the Channel Islands for during the months of Feb to July. I mentioned possible salmon and spring halibut fishing. His reaction to this was "how about Mexico". I let him know my expertise and desires did not include Mexican fishing activities but I had information which would be of great help.

I called local the captain/owner of Reel Graphics Keith Donett and introduced Rafael. Well from this point things warmed up and we were on Alaska Airlines headed to Puerto Vallarta and the mainland of Mexico in a week going to fish the giant Yellowfin Tuna, Marlin, Dorado and many other warm water fish on Captain Keith's 47' Cabo.

Unlike most warm water fisheries I have fished where most time you troll jigs until you get a

strike then fight the fish to the boat this fishery has small rocky crags 5 to 30 miles offshore where most all species of the warm water game fish gather along the ledges. Combine this with 84 degree water and water full of baitfish and your headed for action. The first day out we headed 35 miles out to a drop off in the 1,000 fathom range where a hard current break can be found with fish feeding. We hooked several dorado while slow trolling.

As usual about the time one stretches out for the mid morning snooze we had a zip (light strike on the lures) and soon after a marlin appeared with it fin out of the water and wanting to eat. We quickly dropped back a prerigged baited light game rod and bingo we had a 300 pound blue marlin hooked.

After an hour's fight Rafael released the fish. Day two the fishing went up a notch with Dorado following the boat around wanting to come aboard and ride with us. Well, after 10 or so we decided enough.

As the day continued the area kept showing more life until Keith spotted 6 or 7 large Yellow-fin tuna in the 250 to 300+ pound range. He sent a kite out about 300 feet with a live Cavaito bait and in about 2 minutes a large tune jumped half out of the water to catch the surface skipping bait.

The angler Rafael spent the next three hours enjoying the use of the fighting chair. Finally, five mile from hookup we boated a 276 pond tuna. Great fishing trip. If you have interest in Mexico fishing contact Keith Donette he is an expert south of the border weather your boat or his.

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
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
