



As everyone is tired of hearing, 2020 has been an awfully bad year for events. We had to cancel all our usual Men's and Ladies' Tournaments, as well as our lobster Fundraiser Dinner and scampi Anglers' Awards Dinner. Some members were able to get out to go fishing, and we even had some "Big Fish of the Month" prizes. In March, Billy LeCroy turned in a Mackerel, in April, Rande Lance caught a 15-lb. Halibut, in May, Cooper Palamountain caught a 6.9-lb. Red Rockfish, and in July, Mark Palamountain caught a 33.4-lb. Bluefin Tuna which captured the "Big Fish of the Year" as well.

Anglers' Club Info: Anglers' dues of \$10 for the 2021 fishing season are due before January 31, 2021. Please send in your Anglers' dues with your regular club dues billing. If you forgot and sent the CIYC dues in without your Anglers' dues, you can provide a SEPARATE check made out to "Channel Islands Yacht Club, Anglers" and put Anglers' Dues in the memo section of the check. Send it or bring it to the Club. Or you can pay through the new Foreup system - watch for the announcements.

When you are a CIYC Anglers' Club member, you can win \$50.00 if you bring in the biggest legal fish of the month. Marlin, sharks, rays, and tournament fish do not count. You can only win once a year, but as the Lotto people are fond of saying, "You can't win if you don't play."

Anglers' Club Big Fish rules:

- 1. Fish must be caught within 100 miles of Channel Islands Harbor
- 2. Marlin, sharks, and rays are not to be considered as winners
- 3. Must be caught on rod and reel
- 4. Fish can be verified by any CIYC member (there is a scale in the shed on the patio)
- 5. Fisherperson must be a paid CIYC Anglers' Club member
- 6. Angler must bring the fish to the boat, can have help gaffing or netting
- 7. CIYC, PCYC or Channel Islands Sportfishing scales can be used; others if verified
- 8. Tournament fish do not count except for the Big Fish of the Year
- 9. An angler can only win the Big Fish of the month one time a year
- 10. At the yearly Anglers' Awards dinner, the Big Fish of the Year is awarded \$100. It does not have to be a fish submitted as a Big Fish of the Month to qualify, but it can be a tournament fish. So, keep fishing!

WSB Pens Update: We are waiting for the promised delivery of approximately 10K Juvenile White Sea Bass that were delayed because of a failed health check prior to delivery. They are being treated and will be delivered in December after they recover from the treatments.

Reminder: Rock fish season ends December 31st, 2020, and doesn't reopen until March 1st, 2021! These species may only be taken or possessed in waters less than a 75-fathom depth contour (450 feet). The daily bag and possession limit is 10 fish in combination with all species within the RCG Complex. Yelloweye Rockfish, Bronze Spotted Rockfish, and Cowcod may not be retained (bag limit: zero). There are exceptions, so check here: https://www.wildlife.ca.gov/Fishing/Ocean/Regulations/Groundfish-Summary#south to get the most current regulations!



Doc Lines

The tale of Declaration vs. Memorandum: This is a good example of how large groups of scientists, epidemiologists, and practicing physicians fundamentally disagree about how to deal with the Covid pandemic.

The first is the so-called *The Great Barrington Declaration* put forward by epidemiologists from Harvard, Stanford, and Oxford. It calls for reopening schools, colleges, and businesses. It calls for particular attention to be paid in protecting the elderly and those with significant comorbidities. It suggests that herd immunity can only be achieved if enough younger people develop mild or asymptomatic infections. The authors argue that this: "...would allow COVID-19 to spread in a population where it is less likely to be deadly, by encouraging widespread immunity that is not dependent on a vaccine." The declaration was co-signed by more than 44,000 scientists, epidemiologists, and practicing physicians. The American Institute for Economic Research, sponsored the declaration. https://gbdeclaration.org/

"While this is a very dangerous disease for the elderly, for children it's much less dangerous than the annual flu," stated one study author, Martin Kulldorff, PhD. "And for people in their 20s and 30s, it's not a dangerous disease at all." Kulldorff has criticized widespread testing of asymptomatic persons. He added, "There is little purpose in using tests to check asymptomatic children to see if it is safe for them to come to school," since the positives will close schools and leave children deprived. "Testing is intended to save lives, not to detect asymptomatic people who are otherwise healthy," he wrote. "With the new CDC guidelines, strategic age-targeted viral testing will protect older people from deadly COVID-19 exposure, and children and young adults from needless school closures."

In response, a second group of prominent scientists issued *The John Snow Memorandum* (one of the founders of modern epidemiology) which was co-signed by some 6,900 scientists and doctors and argued their case against the herd immunity movement. With over 35 million people infected with SARS-CoV-2 worldwide, and a second wave hitting the world, the team, representing multiple academic medical centers, emphasized the need for strong, clear communication on the latest evidence. They noted that the highly contagious nature of this pathogen, combined with the overall susceptibility of the largely unexposed population, creates dangerous community spread. With an infection fatality "several-fold higher than that of seasonal influenza," the esteemed scientists and physicians argue that the death toll would be catastrophic. Moreover, many who are infected experience ongoing symptoms which will only add cost and human toll to this unprecedented health crisis. https://www.johnsnowmemo.com/

The authors of the memorandum point to Japan, Vietnam, and New Zealand as examples of robust COVID-19 responses and argue the use of herd immunity in any pandemic management represents a tragically flawed approach with catastrophic outcomes.

So there you are. Two diametrically opposed opinions by the most prominent scientists from top university hospitals and institutes. So much for the call to "listen to scientists." Which ones? What are we supposed to do? I guess presidents, governors, and mayors are free to choose their own experts from among scientists with diametrically opposite opinions.

For example: Because of the new surge in Coronavirus cases, Dr. Michael Osterholm, COVID-19 adviser to Joe Biden, suggests a lockdown for four to six weeks. Dr. Scott Atlas, adviser to President Trump, is against lockdowns. Dr. Fauci, who was for lockdowns in March, is now also against lockdowns. What would you choose?

The origin of the Parade of Lights in the Marina

As with so many other celebrations in this harbor when it was in its infancy, CIYC and its members were involved. In December of 1966, a group of men from our club and CI Harbor Association got together at the Channel Clipper restaurant and planned the first Parade of Lights in the harbor. They set the date for December 18th and started laying plans. The dreams were big: There could be as many as 100 boats in the parade, and entries would include power and sail up to 85 feet and down to dinghies and even surfboards with candlelight. In the center would be an anchored barge with a large decorated tree lighted by a generator. Santa Claus and his reindeer would be booked for passage. Harbor buildings would be decorated, music piped across the waterways, carolers on the boats, and snack time after the parade for every entrant. They planned to have the reigning harbor queen from Memorial Day weekend present the trophies and plaques to the winners. They even had a local artist making posters to advertise the event.

That first event got started with about 30 entries, big and small. The mayor and other dignitaries took off on an 85-foot yacht, the Dry Martini, owned by Bud Smith. It had to withdraw after one circuit around the harbor because it ran out of fuel. Among the other entries, there was one boat with lights in the form of a sleigh, a barge representing Santa's workshop, a Hawaiian Christmas complete with dancing girls, Lucky Santa, and another barge with Santa Claus and Rudolf, the Red-nosed Reindeer. A yacht calling attention to the Christmas Seal campaign and the Ventura County Tuberculosis and Health Association won the sweepstakes award. It featured the TB association's symbol, a large double-armed cross, in lights. The yacht's owner was the secretary of the county TB association. That year's festivities garnered close to 4,000 spectators.

The following year, ignoring bone-chilling temperatures, about 50 boats were expected, but only 34 ignored the weather, went ahead, and circled the floating Christmas tree that had grown a little since the previous year. The Oxnard Boys' Club played Christmas carols on one boat, and Santa Claus bellowed out his "Merry Christmas" to the estimated spectator crowd of 10,000 plus. Dry Martini did not run out of fuel and won the first-place trophy.

The 3rd annual parade was now a tradition. Thirty boats signed up - the perpetual trophy went to Island Packers, and sweepstakes to Andiamo. a 34' cruiser, owned by a CIYC member. Dry Martini's decoration de-

picted a giant marlin leaping high over an angler's rod in a splash of light, but it didn't get it any

award. The following year with 30 entries again, Dry Martini as the Santa Claus float with CIYC Commodore Ben Faulkner onboard, led the parade. The Boy Scouts, with the help of girls, decorated their boat and took the perpetual trophy. Our newly elected Commodore, Bob Dryden, on his Andiamo got the sweepstakes. Decorated houses in the Oxnard Beach area



were also being judged on their decorations. Over the years there have been a lot of innovatively decorated boats:

A sailboat was rigged as a pulsating Star of Bethlehem towing the Three Wise Men in a dinghy; another year it was decorated as a candy cane pulling a lighted glass of Christmas cheer behind it. In 1972 there was a special entry: A 66-inch dinghy won the top award. The owner, a member of Bahia Cabrillo Yacht Club, had spent 3



months decorating it as Santa's sleigh drawn by a team of reindeer. The lighting was provided by a 1,750-watt generator which also helped balance the 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ -foot skiff: three times its length due to the reindeer.

As the years went on, the parade would pretty much get into a routine with more yacht clubs in the area competing for the perpetual trophy. Our club has been very active since the beginning and has gotten top awards several times. It is very sad to see that the excitement has kind of disappeared. Does it have something to do with the professional decorators who have taken the volunteer, 'home-made' fun out of it, or maybe the harbor trying to keep the word 'Christmas' out of the themes? Santa Claus is an important part of the parade every year.

In 2014 Rear Commodore Vidar and I had the honor of representing the club with our Blue Mast, an Islander 41 ketch. We had a fantastic crew helping. The theme was 'A Buccaneer's Holiday.' It was not an easy theme but our team worked miracles. We heard nothing from the judges or the harbor after

the parade – finally, more than one week later, Vidar called the harbor office to ask if they had decided who won the awards - Oh, yes, they had. We won 3 awards: the trophy, the sweepstakes, and the best-dressed crew. Vidar had to pick up the awards at the harbor office. That year created a bad feeling, and a couple of years later the club didn't participate. Luckily, we did in 2019 with a fantastic entry that took the sweepstakes. Let's hope we can keep the childlike spirit of Christmas in the parades for the future. It really gives us a good start on our Holidays.

Dec 12th Holiday Food and Toy Drive at Fisherman's Wharf

The Harbor Department and HBCA and many community and harbor organizations are teaming up to help those who are struggling this challenging holiday season. Partnering for the Holiday Food & Toy Drive will demonstrate that organizations which do not see eye-to-eye on Harbor issues can work together for the benefit of the community.

The Holiday Food & Toy Drive will benefit Food Share of Ventura County and Spark of Love Toy Drive, an annual effort by local fire departments which provided toys to more than 6,000 children last year. In normal times, an estimated 1 in 6 people in Ventura County experiences food insecurity. Usually, Food Share distributes to 75,000 people per month, but this year, the number is closer to 150,000 per month due to the impact of coronavirus.

On the day of the event, donations can be safely dropped off with no contact at a location at Fisherman's Wharf. Masked and gloved volunteers will unload the donations from cars and provide them to Food Share and the Spark of Love Toy Drive. Those living in the harbor area can schedule a boat pick up, organized by Frank Laza, from their docks.

The goal is to raise a "boat load" of food and toys. Monetary donations can also be made to Food Share and matched up to \$5,000. To be matched, monetary donations may be made now via text WHARF to 41444 or go to this link: https://app.mobilecause.com/form/gHVTMA?vid=e01hs - or cash and checks may be written to "Food Share of Ventura County" and dropped off on December 12th at Fisherman's Wharf.

Harbor Department Director Mark Sandoval said he's excited to co-host the event in partnership with HBCA. "It's our pleasure to co-host the Holiday Food & Toy Drive with a group of community members who have a passion for the Harbor and helping others. We encourage all to join us at Fisherman's Wharf in the spirit of giving, particularly during this holiday season."

Many families and children across Ventura County have been impacted by fires and the corona virus. Monica White, Food Share's President and CEO, says many are working families or underemployed, or who may have lost their jobs because of shutdowns. Those who are able can make this holiday a bit better for many families and children by generously sharing and donating.
