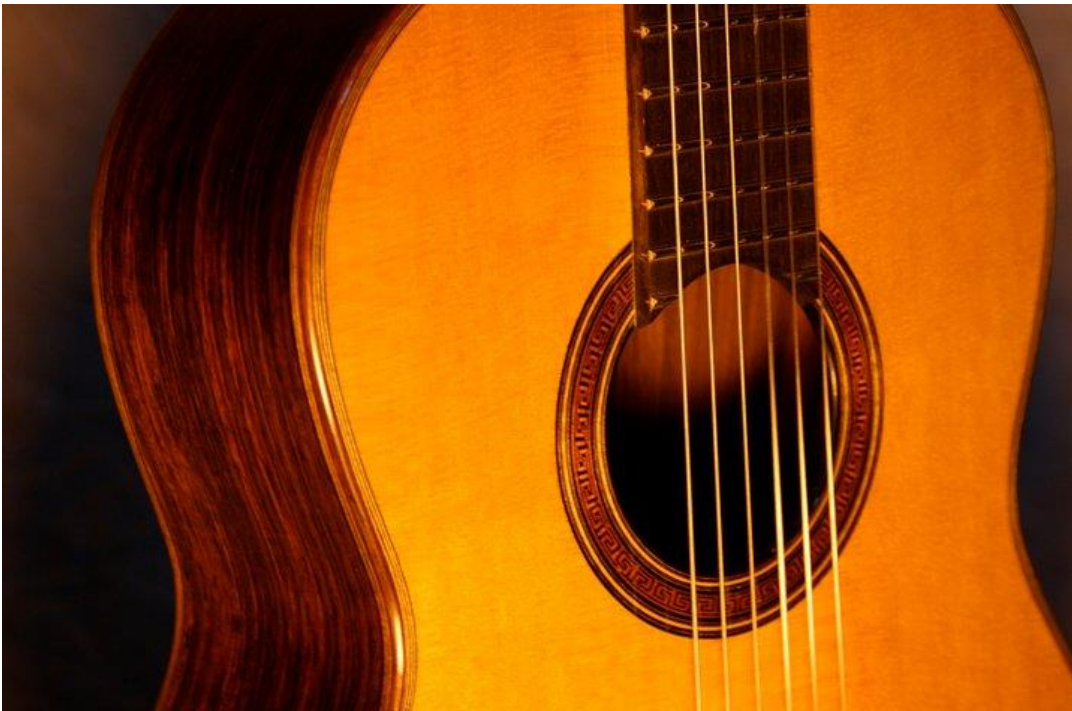

Dear Members,

September starts the time of year that brings with it the election of our Board of Directors. The nominees were presented at the August General Meeting and are in this edition of the Currents. The Nominating Committee's slate of candidates is running for four director positions, each for a two-year term. According to our Amended and Restated Bylaws of 2016, when a Commodore finishes his or her term in office, any remaining term on the Board of Directors shall become vacant. A new Director for the vacated Commodore's position shall be elected for the one-year term at the general election in October by a separate vote. Simply put, in September at the general election the General Membership will elect four directors each for two-year terms, and in October the General Membership will elect one director for a one-year term. Nominations for the one-year term will come from the floor. In total, five directors will be elected for 2019, four will have two-year terms and one will serve a one-year term.

“WITHOUT MUSIC, LIFE WOULD BE A MISTAKE” – Friedrich Nietzsche

When Thomas Jefferson had problems in finding the proper words while penning the Declaration of Independence, he played the violin for inspiration. As did Albert Einstein while struggling with complex equations. It is astonishing how music affects our minds and bodies.

For instance, Baroque music causes the heart to relax and beat to the rhythm. The mind becomes more able to concentrate. Mozart's music, with its pattern of 60 beats per minute, activates the left and right brain. Activation of both hemispheres of the brain maximizes learning and retention of information; so listening to such music helps in studying. The ancient Greeks sang their dramas because that helped them to remember the words more easily. If listening to Mozart before taking an IQ test, one's score improves by 9 points.

King George I of England had memory problems. After reading in the Bible that King Saul had the same problem and overcame it by listening to music, he commissioned Handel to write some special music for him. Handel wrote his *Water Music* for this purpose.

High school students who study music have higher grade point averages; they also develop faster physically. The three best schools in the country place special emphasis on music and arts. It's a shame that music programs are cut first when budgetary problems creep in.

Studies using functional MRI (f-MRI) show enormous activation of both hemispheres while a person listens to music. But when one plays an instrument, f-MRI lights up like a Christmas tree. All neurons are firing up and communicating with each other.

Hens lay more eggs when listening to Strauss's Blue Danube, cows yield more milk while listening to Mozart, and wheat grows more quickly when exposed to music.

Luckily for our members, there are a number of musical events happening in the club: Barbara's Variety Show, the Ventura British Brass Band, Razzberry Jazz Band, Ray Ray and the Posse, the Cocoknots, our own CIYC Band, music at social events, and Line Dancing; they all help our brains to fire up.

An Open Transparent Update of the Harbor's Public Works Plan or More Piecemeal Planning with New Harbor Director, Mark Sandoval?

Channel Islands Harbor has a new Harbor Director, Mark Sandoval. This new beginning offers Sandoval an opportunity to demonstrate that he brings an open transparent process to operating the harbor. The best start to show how he plans to do this is to provide the public with an overdue Master Plan for the entire harbor by updating the 32-year old Public Works Plan (PWP).

Over 10 years ago, at the February 8, 2008 Coastal Commission hearing, Lyn Krieger attested that a comprehensive landside plan was in process. She told the Commissioners that it was critical to push forward a separate comprehensive waterside amendment (PWPA 3) so the aging docks and marinas could be replaced.

Krieger claimed she needed more time for a thorough and accurate landside plan. Though the Commission did not want to separate the landside plan from the waterside plan, they agreed to “bring forward” the waterside plan with the understanding that a comprehensive landside plan was forthcoming as it was purported to be in the planning and public workshop phase. There were similar concerns and strong objections voiced by the public as well.

Peter Douglas, the Coastal Commission Executive Director at the time, believed it necessary to even send a letter to the Board of Supervisors on December 1, 2008, “strongly” requesting that the County “avoid piecemeal amendments...that the County prepare a comprehensive PWP update.” Four PWP amendments later, still no comprehensive PWP update – just more piecemeal planning. Where is the landside plan Krieger claimed was in process over 10 years ago?

The public must continue to demand a comprehensive update of the PWP for the harbor. What business can be effective and efficient without a plan? Now the new Harbor Director can demonstrate how he will operate the harbor – with piecemeal planning or an updated comprehensive Public Works Plan.

Update on Harbor Water Quality

An organized effort by the Channel Islands Neighborhood Council and CIYC filed letters with the Water Quality Control Board (WQCB) urging that the NRG permit for final closure of the plant include conditions for continuous monitoring of the water quality and the development of a mitigation plan. Heal the Bay also supported this effort with a letter. Sara Wan, HBCA's coastal expert, consulted on the issue. Rocco Belmonte reports that a formal petition filing is planned after September 13, though it is unlikely that the WQCB will be able to require these restrictions since the original permits have already been granted.

Representatives from the harbor HOAs, the CI Neighborhood Council, and the Harbor & Beach Community Alliance met with the new Oxnard City Manager, Alexander Nguyen, regarding the water quality and other issues concerning the harbor community. The City offered support such as water quality monitoring but stated this was not an issue the City could resolve alone.

Belmonte reports that over the past several weeks, they have learned the following about the harbor and its water quality:

The main threat to harbor water quality is an Algae bloom that depletes the oxygen level in the water. This bloom is caused by three factors:

Nutrients in the water – e.g. from storm drain runoff

Water temperature – this has been higher than normal this summer

Water residence time – (time the water sits in the harbor before it is refreshed by new ocean water) a 2003 study estimated this was approximately 18 days naturally; with the power plant running, it was estimated to be 12 days



The 2003 Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the City and County specified recirculating pumps on the north end (Seabridge) of the harbor at the time of the plant closure. However, the pumps were not clearly defined and the installed pump vault has been found inadequate. The City has installed a pump and seven aerators, but their impact is undetermined as of this article. The City also plans to install a few aerators near the entrance of the canal. The City indicates that the dissolved oxygen levels have improved, but the reason is unclear other than natural causes.

An organized group of volunteers will continue to seek a solution to the ongoing issue of harbor water quality. This includes meeting with hydraulics engineering firms and other experts to identify long-term solutions and mitigation plans. This will require funds to be raised from harbor residents.

Update on Fisherman's Wharf Proposed 400-Apartment Complex

The County continues to be intractable. The County, in Lyn Krieger's July 20, 2018, letter to the City repeats the request that the City's Local Coastal Plan (LCP) be made to conform to its General Plan. This is contrary to coastal law. In the Coastal Zone, it is the LCP that governs, not the General Plan; so if anything, the General Plan should be made to conform to the LCP.

In addition the County requested the following:

The City and County agree to process a Land Use Plan Amendment (LUPA) only, with no amendment to the Coastal Zoning ordinance at this time.

The City acknowledge officially that this LUPA is exempt from CEQA

The City process such an LUPA within 90 days, including a review and hearing before City Council

The City responded to the County's letter on August 6, 2018. In this letter, the City respectfully disagreed with certain characterizations identified in Krieger's letter regarding "events that occurred, documents and information that have been provided, and the assurances and reassurances that were made."

The City's letter continued on to say that the City had, in cooperation and good faith, streamlined the process for the Developer and was unable to accept requests for further concessions in its LCP process. The City also asserted its right and responsibility to identify and consider the environmental impact of the project, given its proposed size and scope. Therefore, it could not guarantee that it will conduct a hearing before City Council on the LCP Amendment within 90 days from the Developer's submittal of a complete application (which has not occurred to date).

At this point, it is critical that the public continue to support the City's position. It is important that the community stay vigilant regarding the County's actions. For more information go to HBCA.info
