As I am writing this, we successfully completed the 92nd SCYA Midwinter Regatta. We had a great turnout and it was wonderful to see all the sailors from our club and other yacht clubs!

Here are results from February 19-20 Midwinter Regatta - 2 days with very different conditions. On Saturday the breeze increased to nearly 20kts during the day which created shorter period wind waves and challenging conditions for all! MADDOG broke her tiller during race 2 and was out for the rest of the regatta. At the end of the day, the RC boat sacrificed one race mark and left another overnight when the wind and seas became too rough to retrieve them.

Ever wonder about the origin of "Bristol Boat" and "in Bristol condition?"

The Bristol Channel (N51.3564° W4.1845°) lies between south Wales and southwest England. Its tidal range is 15 meters (49 ft), which is second only to the Bay of Fundy in Eastern Canada. Because of the strong tides and scarcity of safe havens in the Bristol Channel, a well-found boat with all gear in working order is essential when navigating these treacherous waters. A local sailor's rhyme goes: "Twixt Hartland Point and Padstow Bay is a sailor's grave by night or day." A specialized style of sailing boat, the Bristol Channel Pilot Cutter, once sailed by "one man and a boy," has a long and illustrious history in the area. During its working life, the Bristol Channel Pilot Cutter was the byword for ruggedness and short-handed sailing ease in all weather conditions, spending weeks on end at sea in some of the most challenging waters of the world.

Wednesday, April 6th, kicks off our first Wet Wednesday.

Maritime Institute Captain's class takes place April 18th – April 29th from 8am-4pm.

WSB Fishing:

White Seabass fishing has been very slow around the Channel Islands so far, but the season is just around the corner and the squid lightboats are out: hopefully a good sign that there is bait around.

The recreational fishery for White Seabass remains open year-round. The daily bag/possession limit is three fish, except that only one fish may be taken in waters south of Point Conception between March 15 and June 15. The minimum size limit is 28 inches, total length, or 20 inches, alternate length. Please remember "one and done." If you caught your WSB limit, don't keep fishing them and planning to release them. Because they are a delicate fish, they may not survive handling while being released.

EVALI - E-cigarette Vaping-induced Lung Injury

The name EVALI is in response to a growing number of cases of severe lung illness related to using e-cigarette and vaping products - the first case being identified in 2019.

EVALI is found in younger patients as well as older. According to the 2021 National Youth Tobacco Survey, more than two million middle- and high-school students are vaping. 'Dabbing' is the use of e-cigarettes or vapes that include *cannabis concentrates*.

What causes EVALI? The most likely culprit is *vitamin E acetate* (an additive in some *THC*-containing e-cigarettes). It is the primary, but not the only, cause of EVALI.

In addition to vitamin E acetate, there are many other substances and sources of products in vaping materials that are being examined as possible causes. The CDC and pulmonary health researchers around the country are continuing to investigate.

Diagnosis is mostly a process of elimination because symptoms can be similar to those in many other respiratory diseases. Symptoms include shortness of breath, fever and chills, cough, vomiting, diarrhea, headache, dizziness, rapid heart rate, and chest pain.

Chest X-ray and CT scan images are often confused with the hazy opacities seen in severe Covid cases that indicate tissue damage.

The course of the illness is unpredictable. Among the cases reported, 96% of patients required hospitalization, including some who subsequently died.



Treatment initially consists of antibiotics and/or antivirals. But as soon as infections (pneumonia, viral pneumonia) are ruled out, large doses of *corticosteroids*, just as in Covid cases, are given to help fight inflammation in the lungs: so-called 'organizing pneumonia.'

Patients with more severe cases will need hospitalization and, because they may be unable to breathe on their own, could be placed on a ventilator. Even patients who have less severe symptoms may need supplemental oxygen.

Even after recovering and gaining the ability to breathe on their own, some patients have relapsed, and even died, soon after discharge from the hospital. It is recommended that all patients, regardless of severity of their cases, see a pulmonologist to follow up.

E-cigarettes only entered the market about a decade ago, and we are still learning the long-term effects. With this recent breakout of EVALI, researchers are working hard to learn as much as possible about the illness, its causes, and the most effective treatments.

Vaping e-cigarettes is less deadly compared to smoking tobacco, but one should rethink their use. Lung cancer, emphysema, COPD, and cardiovascular diseases are caused by myriad carcinogenic substances in tobacco – however, vaping has also proven to be dangerous and sometimes deadly.

Spinnaker boats sailed 18.8 nm from the Mandalay mark, around Platform Gilda, back to Mandalay, Ventura R2 buoy, and Ventura Harbor to finish. NonSpin boats sailed 16.2 miles and headed directly to Ventura after rounding Gilda. Channel Islands Harbor Watch

Potential Impacts To Channel Islands Harbor and Beaches

Harbor Development

The Harbor Department is preparing to put the Peninsula rock revetment work out to bid. Once a company is selected, the revetment work might take up to six months. The rock revetment must be completed before the new Hyatt Place hotel can begin construction. It is important that the rock revetment work takes place as soon as possible so it will not further delay the hotel project. The Harbor Department chose to do the rock revetment work from the landside versus waterside to save an estimated \$500,000+ per the previous Harbor Director, Mark Sandoval.

The Request for Proposal (RFP) for the Whale's Tail facility has not be reissued as planned in January/February. This delay was due to staffing issues per the Harbor Director, Michael Tripp.

The Harbor Department plans to meet with the developer of a proposed visitor-serving lodging project on parcel N-1 that is south and adjacent to the public boat launch ramp. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss potential issues raised by the California Coastal Commission staff regarding the proposed project concept that is consistent with the Harbor's Vision Plan.

Potential Impact of Election Outcome for a New Supervisor for County District 2

Linda Parks, the current Supervisor representing District 2, will term out at the end of this year.

Whoever is elected to replace her on the Board of Supervisors could potentially impact the public's concerns regarding the harbor's water quality related to agricultural runoffs and the harbor's development policies and processes that impact transparency and coastal access. Other issues that could impact this community and the entire County are oil drilling and air pollution policies. District 2's new Supervisor could potentially change the County Board of Supervisors' position on protecting coastal resources and on environmental health and stewardship.

For Tim and Jennifer Smith, life at the yacht club has been an adventure—as well as a home away from home for many years. As they de-

scribe it, their house may be in Sanger, fifteen miles east of Fresno, but "we live at the boat."
