#### Anglers' dues of \$10 for the 2023 fishing season are now due.

Please send in your Anglers' dues with your regular club dues billing. Or you may pay by notifying us and we will charge your account in the Point-of-Sale Foreup system. If you forgot and sent the dues in without the Anglers' dues, you can provide a SEPARATE check made out to "Channel Islands Yacht Club" and put Anglers' Dues in the memo section of the check and send it or bring it to the Club. Or you can pay through the CIYC Foreup billing system – just let me know you want me to charge it to your account.

We are planning for an exciting and fun-filled year. If you are a current member, you know the drill, but for those of you who are new and may want to join in the fun, here are the details:

For only ten bucks you will be able participate in the Club's Tournaments, be eligible for the \$50 Big Fish of the Month Award, and also the \$100 Big Fish of the Year Award.

Many months go by when no, or few, fish are weighed in which means that the ¼ lb. mackerel may be worth \$50, so weigh him in! An Angler can only win the monthly prize once a year, so we should have 12 different winners.

Anglers' Club funds raised through dues and fundraisers like the Lobster and Scampi dinners have in the past been used for projects around the Yacht Club, for the improvement of our fishing experience, and to support the White Seabass grow-out pens in the harbor. In the past we paid for the outside band music on Opening Day, paid for 1/3 the cost of the new CIYC sign on the front of our building, \$1000 towards the rehabilitation of the patio, and purchased a new bike rack. At the WSB pens we purchased new containment nets and spent considerable funds on professional divers to clean the predator net on the pens.

As always, I am soliciting ideas from the members on how to improve the services of the Anglers' Club. We hope to have an In-Harbor Fishing Tournament in addition to the Ladies' Fishing Tournament and the Men's Fishing Tournament. Please enclose a note indicating your interest or any other ideas to benefit the welfare of the Club.

#### **Updates on Harbor Happenings**

#### Peninsula Rock Revetment and Hyatt Place Hotel Construction

The rock revetment work required for the marina area where the new Hyatt Place Hotel is planned, is anticipated to be done by the end of May 2023.

Once completed, hotel construction can start in June 2023 - given no unanticipated issues.

#### <u>Fisherman's Wharf:</u> Karl's Project is the Right Choice

For decades, the community was told that developers would only be willing to invest in revitalizing the Fisherman's Wharf area if allowed to build high density apartment complexes.

#### Renovation of the Whale's Tail Restaurant

A four-month Exclusive Right To Negotiate (ERN) was awarded in October 2022 to the group led by the team of Anthony Carron and Jonathan Zilli. Anthony Carron is a chef and restaurant consultant on food and menu development. Jonathan Zilli is an experienced entrepreneur and consultant investor with an extensive track record in business development. In his earlier business career, he was responsible at Paramount Pictures for creating, developing, and launching the successful Bubba Gump Shrimp Restaurant Company concept. The team of Carron and Zilli has proposed a by-the-ocean California vibe classic seafood restaurant specializing in locally sourced fresh seafood.

This Exclusive Right to Negotiate (ERN) for the Whale's Tail will expire at the end of January 2023. The Harbor Department will announce the results of this ERN period at the end of January.

There have been several proposals to do so and all have failed to move forward for various reasons. Now for the first time, Fisherman's Wharf has a developer, Karl's, that will deliver a project that conforms with the policies of the Harbor's Public Works Plan (PWP) and the California Coastal Act. It also is consistent with visitor-serving development that the community has, for tens of years, advocated.

The project provides a destination for families and kids at the harbor where currently there is none.

Channel Islands Harbor has no wholesome fun place for families with children and neither does Ventura Harbor. However, when there are events for families with kids at these harbors, they are well-attended and enjoyed.

Families should have a place at Channel Islands Harbor that they can afford to visit often and enjoy with their children. Enjoyment of the waterfront cannot be limited only to those who can afford to live nearby or afford to go there.

Karl's "Strawberry Adventure Village" also adds balance to the range of facilities and attractions offered throughout the entire harbor, including those north of the bridge and the upcoming new hotel and restaurant on Peninsula Road, as well as a revived Whale's Tail restaurant.

Karl's widens the harbor's appeal and expands its accessibility to new demographic and economic groups of visitors outside the harbor's neighboring communities where there are many retirees and second homes. Each new development should add something different to the range of visitor-serving activities the harbor has to offer and expand the range of visitors to the harbor.

Karl's can be operating within the next few years. It will generate needed activity at the harbor that will support other harbor businesses, and this is why many of the harbor businesses support Karl's.

Karl's project is consistent with the principles and policies of the Coastal Act of "maximum access" and "lower cost visitor and recreational facilities". It does not require amendments to the Public Works Plan (PWP), Oxnard's Local Coastal Plan (LCP), and the Harbor Channel Islands (HCI) Ordinances.

#### Karl's Project is the Right Choice Continued...

It is also consistent with the California Coastal Commission's Environmental Justice Policy's imperative "preserving and providing for lower cost recreational facilities...inclusive for all who work, live and recreate on California's coast." It is consistent with the Board's unanimously approved motion on September 13, 2022, of "ensuring public access where it is required by the Coastal Act."

For decades, projects have been submitted that required amendments to the PWP, LCP and HCI and have been rejected. These amendment processes can take 5-7 years, as evidenced by the previous proposed Fisherman's Wharf project. Any proposal that includes residential must go through these processes, delaying any development with no guarantee such amendments will be approved. During this period of uncertainty, Fisherman's Wharf will continue to deteriorate and no construction or real investment in the area can take place.

The characterization of Karl's project as an "Amusement Park" hyperbolizes what is proposed. Karl's proposed project is different from this emotionally charged and exaggerated description: it is not gated and ticketed to enter; it is not a large collection of mechanical rides for the high-sensation seekers; it does not include fair/carnival-like games and shows. It proposes 3-5 small rides for children as Karl's has explained, a themed restaurant, small inn, exhibits/demonstrations of making strawberry products, retail stores; it retains views of the entire waterfront, and includes walking paths and seating areas for people to enjoy the views or have relaxing strolls throughout the area.

Opposition to Karl's has not accurately described or been unaware of the steps in the development process. Design will be a step in the process once the Exclusive Right To Negotiate (ERN) is approved. Karl's is willing to incorporate in its project a more waterside, nautical, and California flavor in its style to address some of the concerns.

No matter the project at this site, there will be concerns regarding traffic and parking. Valid concerns can only be addressed and resolved after there is a more detailed project plan. It is too early to speculate about potential problems without knowing those details and facts.

It is apparent there is misunderstanding of the development process and where the decision-making responsibility and authority reside. Asking for input from the community is not asking for a vote. Preferences can vary within the same community because they are subjective and based upon tastes, viewpoints, beliefs, and sentiment.

Like any coastal landowner, the County has the right to develop their property as they believe appropriate as long as it meets the coastal policies as reflected in the Coastal Act, PWP, LCP, and the zoning regulations and building codes that govern the area.

Karl's will add balance to the harbor's visitor-serving attractions and facilities. It is consistent with the coastal policies and regulations of the County, the City of Oxnard, and the California Coastal Act. It will help maximize accessibility and enjoyment of Channel Islands Harbor for a wider range of economic and demographic groups, and that's good for the harbor.

#### A Very Merry Giving Event: 2022 Harbor Food & Toy Drive Exceeds Expectations

It will be a Merrier Christmas for many families and kids due to the generosity of so many from the communities near Channel Islands Harbor. They were joined by members of the Fire Department and the Food Share organization.

#### Self-Help & Going Through the Chairs

For most of us, being a member of our self-help yacht club is more than just being involved in boating and having a place to go to have a few drinks at the bar, enjoy a nice dinner, and have a safe drive home.

Traditionally, most of our members step up to help out with whatever it takes to enable our club to function and thrive. The rewards are the camaraderie, the feeling of accomplishment, and being trusted to take on a managing position. On the wall in the entryway are photographs of our Bridge and flag officers.

The Board's responsibilities are to run the Club and make decisions regarding staff, house rules, dues, and more. Board Members serve two-year terms, while each Commodore's position lasts for one year.

We had a Staff Commodore who always asked every member who ran for the Board of Directors if he or she would be willing to "go up the chairs."

Following our By-Laws, the Bridge (Commodore, Vice Commodore, Rear Commodore) is selected from the Board of Directors. Going up all three chairs (RC, VC, and C) is very rewarding and educational.

You really learn what it takes to assume responsibility for the position you hold, and you have the satisfaction of having contributed to our club in a very meaningful way.

**The Rear Commodore** has the responsibility for everything 'on the water.'

**The Vice Commodore** is responsible for the Club House and everything that goes with that.

**The Commodore** has the ultimate responsibility for the club.

These assignments are not set in stone and may be changed by the board from time to time.

A good starting point is to read the Flag Officers' Assignments at the beginning of the roster, the House Rules at the back, and to learn all about, and be mindful of, our club's traditions.

It's important for members to read the <u>By-Laws</u> and keep them handy for reference.

#### **Memberships:**

CIYC offers a variety of memberships that include Regular, Yachting, Racing Associate Member (RAM), and Inactive. This document covers the most common memberships. Dues are charged for each class of membership. The Annual membership dues shall be set by the Board and ratified by a majority vote of the Regular Members. Automatic Cost of living adjustment may apply to future years.

All interested parties must apply for membership via an application process, and be approved by the current Board of Directors.

Dues quoted below are for the year 2023. An application for membership will require a \$100 initiation fee.

The **Regular Membership** is intended for those members who have the right to vote and hold office.

The current dues for a Regular Member are \$1300. Dues may be paid one time in January, semiannually, or quarterly. Billing for dues is included in your monthly invoice. Billing for both semiannually and quarterly carries a \$10 per payment charge.

The semiannual and quarterly options are a convenience to our members. However, regardless of payment choice, the dues commitment is for the whole year.

The current dues for a **Yachting Membership** are 50% of the Regular Membership. Yachting Memberships are intended for those members under the age of 40. The Yachting Membership does not include the right to vote or hold office.

The current dues for **Racing Associate Member (RAM)** are 20% of the Regular Membership and do not include the right to vote or hold office.

RAM Members must register under the CIYC burgee when skipper of a boat in a Southern California Yachting Association (SCYA)-sanctioned regatta or race. Each RAM must take part in 3 Club events and 6 SCYA-sanctioned events annually. The requirements may change as defined by the Board of Directors.

The current dues for Inactive Member are 20% of the Regular Membership and do not include the right to vote or hold office. This is available for a Member who has moved in excess of 100 miles from the Club. The Inactive Member may not reside in the area more than 30 days annually, and may not regularly berth a boat more than 30 days per year within 100 miles of the Club.





#### CIYC RACING REPORT By Cap'n Jane Thomas

Wild Turkey Classic Plastic: In last month's CURRENTS we left off at VSC's Wild Turkey Classic Plastic, Saturday, November 26. This race honors older fiberglass boats and awards trophies only to boats that are more than 20 years old. Newer boats are welcome to participate but don't qualify for the perpetual trophies. A relative youngster, the ultralight CIRRUS (2007, Larry Listing/Bill Wood,

AYC) took 1<sup>st</sup> overall, and qualified 1<sup>st</sup> place perpetual trophy winners from CIYC included WAILANI (1979, Jane Thomas) in Spinnaker class and VELERO (1967, Brent Swanson) in Non-spinnaker class; Roxanne Vettese's RISA (1981, Roxanne Vettese) was 2<sup>nd</sup> in Spinnaker class.

The race format was a pursuit (reverse) start in which each boat's time allowance is calculated in advance from her handicap rating and the course distance. The boat with the highest handicap (slowest boat) starts first at the published race start time. For the remaining boats each receives an assigned start time, which is the published start time + the boat's calculated time allowance. Theoretically, all *should* arrive at the finish line about the same time, and the order of finish determines how the boats place. Thankfully, the Race Committee chose the 6nm course instead of the traditional 15nm. It was an unusual day with a light southerly breeze, which allowed us to "pop the chute" (hoist the spinnaker) right after the start as we sailed northwest. Prior to the race WAILANI had shed a few hundred pounds of accumulated gear and with veteran crew members, Alison, Kelly, and Wailani, and new crew,

Liz and Lisa, she sailed smartly to the Mandalay race buoy and back to Channel Islands Harbor.

#### **Music Therapy**

If you're about to have an MRI you might have a radiology technician ask you what kind of music you like and fit you with earphones to listen to your favorite hits while the big magnet gantry is drumming and hammering its coils.

Instead of being apprehensive about whether they will find a kidney tumor, fatty liver, ovarian cyst, or pelvic prolapse, you are wondering if it's Haydn or Mozart you are listening to. Your mind is distracted in a good way and drawn away from unpleasant and frightening thoughts.

Formal music therapy was defined and first used by the United States War Department in 1945. It helped military service members recovering in Army hospitals with occupational therapy, education, recreation, and physical reconditioning.

Music therapy is an evidence-based treatment that helps with a variety of disorders, including cardiac conditions, depression, autism, substance abuse, and Alzheimer's disease. It can improve memory, lower blood pressure, improve coping, reduce stress, improve self-esteem - and more. You don't need a background in music to participate.

Music therapy may help you psychologically, emotionally, physically, spiritually, cognitively, and socially. A short list of benefits includes: lowering blood pressure, enhanced communication and social skills through experiencing music with others, self-reflection, observing your thoughts and emotions, reducing muscle tension, self-regulation, developing healthy coping skills to manage your thoughts and emotions, increasing motivation, managing pain, and increasing joy.

And, yes, there is a specialty: musical therapist. Either in the hospital, or in nursing homes, or in schools - a therapist will do an interview and suggest whether you listen to the music, compose, play an instrument, or just move your toes to the rhythm.

A few years ago we invited Alex and Wesley Park, virtuosi classical guitar players, to perform at CIYC. One of our members, a school teacher of autistic children, was impressed enough to play some of their YouTube posts for her students and was pleasantly surprised at the calming effect it had on the children. Remarkable.

Music can call up repressed emotions that may then be released. Music can lessen feelings of isolation. Improve mood. Decrease depression. Reduce anxiety. Manage stress.

Considering all the benefits of music, Erika and I invite you to a classical guitar concert. We have invited Alex and Wesley Park to return to CIYC where they embarked on their very successful performance career. Both graduated from the Pepperdine Classical Guitar Department, headed by world-renowned Christopher Parkening. Subsequently, Alex studied with Andrew York at Cal State Fullerton, then at USC with Scott Tennant and Brian Head. He is now on the faculty at both Pepperdine University and Westmont College. Wesley also studied at USC with Scott Tennant and is also on the faculty at Pepperdine.

The concert will be on Tuesday, January 31st. Why on a Tuesday - a dark night at CIYC? This is because it is a special event and the guitar is a subtle instrument which doesn't like noise from the bar.
