HISTORY OF THE YACHT

BY: AMERICAN SAILING HISTORY

When does a boat become a yacht?

One answer has always been: You can tell a yacht when you see one. But It really has nothing to do with size of the boat, weight of the boat, its style, sleeping quarters, head, tiller, or wheel. A yacht is a boat that was designed for the express pleasure of its owner.

The yacht is an invention of the 14th century Dutch. The Dutch used small, fast boats for chasing smugglers, pirates, and criminals. Rich shipowners and merchants began using these small "jaghts" to sail out to celebrate their returning merchant ships. It quickly became chic to use these "jaghts" to take friends out just for pleasure.

Charles II of England spent 10 years in exile in Holland before he was returned to the English throne in 1660. His return to the throne was celebrated by the city of Amsterdam: The city presented Charles with a luxurious 60' yacht, and it included a crew of 20. Her name was Mary. He took great pleasure in sailing her up and down the Thames. He studied navigation, even naval architecture, and he had approximately 20 yachts built during his lifetime. It can be said that he was the world's first yachtsman. His enthusiasm for yachting was contagious and his "MARY" WAS PRESENTED TO KING CHARLES II brother James, Duke of York, joined him and became an avid yachtsman as well.



BY THE DUTCH IN 1660.

As always when there are two sailboats on the water, a race ensues. Soon the first organized regatta was planned as a 40-mile race on the Thames. It took place in 1661 between Katherine, Charles's newly constructed yacht, and Anne, the Duke of York's new yacht. With Charles himself at the helm, Katherine won and a new sport was born.

Yachting remained the Sport of Kings for over a century, but by the 1800s yachting had grown to include participants other than just the crowned heads of Europe. The world's wealthiest had joined in. Yacht Clubs were forming. The first yacht club in the world, the Cork Water Club, was established in Ireland in 1720. Next was the Lough Ree Yacht Club in 1770 (again in Ireland), followed by the Starcross Yacht Club in 1772 in England.

So far the Big Fish of the Month for June is Marc Gault's 31-lb. Halibut, caught June 3rd. He, of course, is keeping the details secret.


In-harbor Fishing Tourney #2:

RAMs and Racing Report, July 2023

Trophies: On Friday, June 16, special guest SCYA Vice Commodore and Trophy Historian, Kathy St Amant, joined us for Lite Bites, prepared by Kat Sotiridy and crew. Kathy gave a great presentation about "Trophies: Sailing History Engraved." All enjoyed her stories about many Southern California racing pioneers and associated trophies as well as some of her personal experiences in the Channel Islands area.





Lifetime member Paul Hatcher presented the recently recovered and refurbished perpetual first-to-finish trophy for the Channel Islands to Marina del Rey race. The trophy was lost for 36 years and is now

ready for this year's race, September 23. We had brought a table full of CIYC trophies from the case to display them for the event, and Bill Brayton and I reflected on a few special ones. Kathy later posted, "The tears flowed as others spoke about various special trophies and the people they were named for. It feels good when my words can enlighten others to explore their history and share their stories."



Racing: After press time last month, s/v WAILANI (Tartan Ten, Jane Thomas) raced in VYC's Commodore's Classic, May 21. We took 2nd place for the 12.8nm course.

On June 3, MAHALO (PCYC, C&C 41, Randy Dickinson) was the winner of PCYC's McCune Race; WAILANI took 2nd place, and RISA (Catalina 38, Roxanne Vettese) took 3rd. Positions 1, 2, and 3 each took home a case of Tarantula Hill beer, which WAILANI's and RISA's crews will certainly enjoy! SWIFT (Hunter Legend 40.5, James Jewell) also participated. No CIYC boats participated in VYC's Governor's Cup on June 10.

CIYC entries in VSC's Frenchy's Rum Run, June 17, included VELERO (Islander 29, Brent Swanson) and SWIFT. I didn't see the race results, but Brent said, "It was a beautiful day on the water and we got done quickly." Jimmy said they "did well and finished in the middle of the fleet."

CIYC's Wild Bill Rig Race (June 24) saw 4 entries. The swell and wind had built up over a couple of days and made it a rough ride, but all completed the 15.3nm course – Mandalay buoy to Platform Gail and back. CIRRUS (AYC, J/124, Larry Listing) took 1st place, FAT TUESDAY (VYC, Santana 30/30, Carlos Brea) took 2nd, RISA took 3rd, and SWIFT took 4th place. Brian Stanton and Monique Cordray took their sailing catamaran, R MANTA SEA, to the Mandalay buoy as the Race Committee boat with PRO Bill Brayton and Christina Ballas. To encourage more boats from Ventura to participate, the race finish was at the Mandalay buoy (approximately midway between Ventura and Channel Islands Harbors) with a reference point ashore for the east end of the line. Racers recorded their own finish times and texted or called the RC with their finish times. We also asked the racers to record their tracks through a free phone app, RaceQs (www.raceqs.com). Mike Geer collected the boats' self-reported finish times, processed the results, and coordinated the RaceQs replay! The software and phone reception from individual boats can be a bit unreliable, but when it works, it's fun to watch!



SMUGGLERS COVE

Smugglers Cove at Santa Cruz Island is part of the Channel Islands National Park and Marine Sanctuary which protects the natural and cultural resources of the islands. I've used Smugglers Cove as my default anchorage on many trips after being blown out of Prisoners, Forney's, or Pelicans. And one of the most glorious sights at Smugglers is a full moon - seeing that luminous orb rising out of the eastern horizon. On our next Full Moon Weekend Cruise, let's make sure to meet up and anchor together at Smugglers.

This cove has a rich and colorful history; it was used by pirates, smugglers, bootleggers, and other outlaws as a hideout and a landing spot for their illicit goods. Prior to European contact, the Chumash Indians inhabited Santa Cruz for at least ten thousand years. Evidence for eleven Chumash villages on the island have been found. The Spaniards named the island Santa Cruz - they were impressed by the friendly Chumash who returned a staff topped by an iron cross to a priest. The Chumash left the island in the early 1800s when the Spanish brought them into their missions on the mainland.

Fur trapper and hunter George Nidever named the cove after visiting the island in 1835. He noticed the cove had a natural cave that could serve as a storage site for smuggled goods. The cove was sheltered from wind and waves, making it ideal for anchoring boats. It became a popular destination for smugglers who used it to evade the authorities and avoid paying taxes or tariffs on their merchandise. Smuggled items included otter pelts, gold dust, Chinese laborers, liquor, opium, and firearms.

A notorious smuggler was Frenchman Hippolyte Bouchard, a pirate who raided the California coast in 1818. He attacked several missions and towns along the coast, looting and burning them. He also captured several ships and confiscated their cargos as well as taking their crews prisoner. He used Smugglers Cove as his base of operations, storing his plunder and holding his captives for ransom.

Another famous smuggler who frequented Smugglers was American explorer and politician John C. Fremont. He led several expeditions to the West in the 1840s and was involved in the Bear Flag Revolt, a rebellion against Mexican rule in California preceding the Mexican-American War. He used Smugglers Cove as a rendezvous point for his men and supplies.

The cove also witnessed some tragic events in its vicinity. In 1853 the *Winfield Scott*, with more than 500 passengers and crew members aboard, ran aground on a reef off middle Anacapa Island. The ship was on its way from San Francisco to Panama, carrying gold seekers who wanted to cross the isthmus and reach the East Coast. Fortunately, no lives were lost, but most of the passengers' belongings and the ship's cargo were either stolen by looters or lost.

Another tragedy in the general area occurred in 1911 when the steamship *Santa Rosa* encountered a storm and foundered on rocks at the outlet of Honda Creek, north of Point Arguello. The ship had been transporting a cargo of lumber from Washington to San Francisco when disaster struck. Four crew members were killed and dozens of people were injured. Of 200 aboard, 192 survived. If you google shipwrecks in the vicinity of Santa Cruz Island, you will find dozens of vessels have been lost. So be careful out there!

We are blessed to have our Channel Islands right off our coast.




