Doc Lines By Fleet Surgeon Zoran Barbaric

Uttar Pradesh - What Public Health Service Should Be

Uttar Pradesh is the largest state in India, with a population of 231 million. If it were a country, it would be the sixth largest country in the world. It's where the Taj Mahal is located.

Its Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath is a Hindu monk who has a zero tolerance policy regarding corruption.

In combating Covid-19, Chief Minister Yogi appointed knowledgeable, uncorrupted public health officials, oversaw them, and protected them from Big Pharma influence. In addition, he instituted a **call center** which, during the pandemic, made 10,000 calls daily to those ill with Covid and those under quarantine.


In early 2020 he created "TEAM 11," consisting of government officials responsible for organizing *test, track, and treat* for Covid patients (*TTT* program). About that time India instituted a national protocol whereby *hydroxychloroquine* was used to prevent Covid in all its health care workers and the household contacts of all laboratory-confirmed cases. In the summer of 2020, Uttar Pradesh switched their state preventive (prophylactic) protocol to *Ivermectin*. The results were so positive that this eventually led to using *Ivermectin* for *early treatment* of Covid patients.

Most of India's states followed the Uttar Pradesh protocol, and two of the early Covid variants (Wuhan and Beta) were almost under total control within two months. The success of the *TTT* program relied almost entirely on massive distribution of Ivermectin to 97,000 villages, using 400,000 health care workers working in teams. They performed the most testing in all of India.

The teams distributed packets with Ivermectin, Zinc, Z-pac, vitamins D3 and C, and doxycycline, with detailed instructions regarding administration. Also, immediate close contacts and cohabitants were either treated or given prophylactic Ivermectin. All for free. By January 2021 the states went quiet on Covid. It was under control. No vaccines yet.

The WHO praised Uttar Pradesh's success but never ever mentioned Ivermectin. Curiously, even in Indian newspapers the *TTT* program was praised but Ivermectin was seldom mentioned. It was as if it never existed. Then Bill Gates visited India, had a meeting with the Indian Prime Minister, and suddenly the Indian media turned against Ivermectin (just as in the US). But Uttar Pradesh didn't give a hoot and continued its program.

In April 2021 the Delta variant hit major Indian cities with ferocity. Fearing lockdowns, migrant workers returned to their hometowns en masse. Uttar Pradesh had a huge number of returning migrants and Delta skyrocketed. TEAM 11 stepped up, the *TTT* program was boosted, packets with Ivermectin and other drugs were distributed, and Ivermectin was also given prophylactically. At the time only 15% of the population in Uttar Pradesh was vaccinated. And they licked Delta within two months. In January and February 2022 Omicron hardly made a blip on the graph.



The graph above is very telling. It compares death rates from Covid in Uttar Pradesh and the US. During their Delta, only 15% of the population was vaccinated (currently 35%). After studying these facts and this graph, you must admit the Indian state did an exemplary job in dealing with the pandemic. Maybe our agencies could learn something from this? The CDC just announced big reforms.


Unlike the very windy race in 2021 when EOLO took 1st place in the Cutters and Sloops class, this year the winds were too light for EOLO to hold her lead.

CIYC racers were also represented on other local classics, including Bill Brayton on CHERRIO II, Dick McNish's yawl, and Steve Aronson on QUASCILLA, Dirk Langer's schooner.

On Saturday and Sunday, August 6 and 7, the winds and sea kicked up for VYC's Summer Regatta as well as the Women-on -the-Water/Women-at-the-Helm (WOW/WAH) event in Marina del Rev.

CIYC racers Shaun Plomteaux (CRITTER, J24) and crew, and Gareth Jones, Dan Maxwell, Andrew Clements, Kinsey Cohen, and Nick Walters (JEDI, J24) took 2nd and 3rd, respectively, against VYC's boats in the Regatta.

Meanwhile, CIYC members Kelly Sherwood-Sloan and Wailani O'Herlihy crewed with CIWSA's Alison Rowe and others on RASCAL (Hunter Legend 38, Kathy St Amant, SCYA Rear Commodore) in the WOW/WAH. They had fun but did not place.

It turned out to be a beautiful day! The predicted southerly didn't materialize but the wind was light, favoring the J24s over the 11.1nm course. In the Double-Handed Bob Cooke Memorial Race Dan Maxwell and Gareth Jones (JEDI, J24) took first place over Bob Cooke's boat, VELERO, an Islander 29 raced by Bob's grandson, Brent Swanson, and Bob's crew member, Larry Burroughs. In the Neil Underwood race Bill Brayton (MADDOG, J24), Chuck Grethel, and Christian Lorentzen took first place over Jimmie Jewell (SERENDIPITY, Hunter Legend 40.5), Douglas Hoover, and Jon Lawson. Neil's daughter Valerie Underwood Willett was unable to race but came to CIYC for the Race Awards.



AdventureSail® Day - Channel Islands 2022

As most of you already know, I am an advocate for women's sailing, co-founder and Commodore of Channel Islands Women's Sailing Association (CIWSA), member of Orange County WSA and the National Women's Sailing Association (NWSA), and skipper of a racing boat usually crewed by women. I was exploring the NWSA website (womensailing.org) and learned about AdventureSail® Day, an annual event held simultaneously on the second Saturday of August (or on an alternate date if desired) at various locations across the US. I read their planning materials and watched the videos, which brought tears to my eyes.

Over the years, CIWSA has granted thousands of dollars in

youth sailing scholarships, mostly to girls, and hosted small groups of Girl Scouts on daysails with a couple of parent chaperones. It was gratifying, but our efforts always seemed limited in scope. When I suggested we consider hosting an AdventureSail® Day – an immersive introduction to sailing for 9-14-year-old underserved girls, the CIWSA Board quickly realized that it would "take a village" to make it happen, but we could do so much more than just take them sailing for a couple of hours. We could open up a whole new world to them! And, with the help of many volunteers and donors, we did just that!

We started recruiting through Boys & Girls Clubs (Lauren Copus, Michele Ackerman),

Big Sisters (Valerie), Girl Scouts (Carol Freeland), and Casa Pacifica (Michele). When registration was lagging, Nicole Woolley compiled a list of local nonprofits that serve girls, kids, and families. Judy Kay connected with Kids and Families for one participant, and we learned of additional possible sources to contact next year. Our renewed connection with the Girl Scouts and BSA contributed approximately 25% of the signups, and approximately 33% learned about the event through a friend.

By mid-July, it had become clear that we were underestimating the number of adults that would be accompanying the girls, and our estimates for food had nearly doubled. Thankfully, the CIYC Board voted to not only let us use the club facilities but also to supply and prepare all the food for the event! Approximately 50 volunteers from CIWSA, CIYC, AYC, FYC and the boating community came together to be recruiters, skippers, cooking and setup/cleanup crew, activity station hosts, curriculum developers, sailing mentors, dock mates, and female role models. NWSA provided nylon gift bags for the girls, Aloha Collection (https://aloha-collection.com) donated 25 anchordesign Tyvek cosmetic bags through Nicole Woolley, Kelly Sherwood's employer (https://assistedcares.com) donated fuzzy fleece blankets, Wescom donated reusable water bottles through PCYF Board member Virginia Panossian, and cash

donations were received from Frank Laza (Central Coast Electric Boats), Deborah Tyhurst, and Brenda Wilson. CIWSA designed and provided commemorative knot-tying cards with a piece of line for practice. In the final few days CIWSA members Michele Ackerman, Bonnie Chaney, Gina Marcaccio, Emilie and Tracie West, Nicole Woolley, and Jane Thomas prepared T-shirts with an iron-on image of the AdventureSail® Day flyer, washed and filled the water bottles, and divvied up the gift items into the NSWA bags.

More than 25 girls had registered for the event, but several participants cancelled in the final few days. We contacted those on the waiting list to fill the empty slots, but actual

attendance for the morning was down to 21 girls.

Saturday morning, August 13, the Wests, Nicole, and Gina greeted the participants, accompanying adults, and volunteers in the downstairs lobby and assured that NWSA waivers had been digitally acknowledged by all. Lisa Marie and John Medlen and Sue Woolf prepared a hearty breakfast for all; the girls especially enjoyed the tater tots and bacon! After breakfast we held a short program and introduced our guest speakers from LA/San Pedro: Capt. Marie Rogers, 2021 NWSA Leadership in Women's Sailing Awardee, 2020 SCYA Peggy Slater Memorial Awardee, SCYA Director, LAYC Staff Commodore, and my longtime

LAYC Staff Commodore, and my longtime friend and co-coach on the Catalina 37s in Long Beach. With Marie came Stephanie Roney, the 15-year recipient of the 2022 NWSA Junior Sailing Scholarship Award. Marie and Stephanie both spoke to the group about their personal journeys and the value sailing has brought to their lives. We then introduced women volunteers with careers in the maritime industry and/or involving STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) and encouraged the girls and their accompanying adults to talk with these role models during the day. All were then invited to visit the various activity stations, which we had set up for the girls and their adults to get a preview into sailing before stepping

Wendell Liljedahl came with a couple of simple props (a yardstick with a tail on one end and a loose-footed mainsail on a stick) for his "Sensing the Wind" activity station on the upper deck of the club, with 360° access to the wind and a view of the trees, water, boats, and wind indicators.

Mike Geer/Melissa Rogers and Christina Ballas brought their Dragonflite 95 RC model racing sailboats, which they used with a fan to demonstrate the "Points of Sail" and "Tacking and Jibing."

Christina also had taken Wendell's idea and a list of names and prepared a "Great Women Sailors" slide show that was displayed on the big TV in the dining room.

Tamara, a new sailor and mom of one of the participants, volunteered to prepare and host the "Parts of a Boat" station.

Carol Freeland and Quincey Cummings hosted the "Safety at Sea" station, shared information about safety equipment and fitted each participant with a personal floatation device (PFD) from CIYC's DAV supply donated by BoatUS and PCYF loaners.

Stephanie Roney, Beverly Burr, Melanie Kemmann and other volunteers coached the girls and their adults on a few important knots at the "Knot-Tying Station."

As the participants were busy at the activity stations, we asked the volunteer skippers to land at one of the empty docks in front of CIYC for passenger pickup and drop off.

Christian Lorentzen was there to help them dock, find their guests, depart, and drop off their passengers afterwards. In total, 11 sailboats ranging from 22' to 41' took the final 20 girls, their accompanying adults, their crew, and additional sailing mentors for a few hours of sailing on the ocean. Skippers and boats included Larry Listing (CIRRUS, J125),

Dina and Marshall Murphy (AYA SOFIA, Beneteau 40.7), Peter Hopps (RED SAILS, Lancer 36), Jane Thomas

(WAILANI, Tartan 10), Mike Geer and Melissa Rogers (KIARA, Catalina 30), Michele Ackerman (ZEPHYR, Catalina 27), Valerie Underwood Willett (FREEDOM TOO, Catalina 27), Mary Plasencia (KANANI, Ranger 26), Capt. Dawn Brooks (MADDOG, J24), Lauren Copus (SWEET DEAL, Capri 22), and

Patricia Nazario (COMPANIONSHIP, Capri 22).

While the inclusion of an adult with nearly every adolescent girl created a very large group, the gratitude and pure joy among the girls and their accompanying adults made it all worth it! Many have already noted

August 12, 2023, on their calendars and are asking to learn more about access to sailing programs for the girls and adults.

It appears we were successful in transferring our passion for sailing and have made some long-term connections! Special thanks go out to the many volunteers who served in multiple capacities. Those not already mentioned above included Alan Hayashi, Dr. Anna Cho, Brooke Rodgers, Darryl Smith, Deborah Tyhurst, Denise Braval, Don Olson, Gene Peck, Gigi Llorin, Hilary Rost, John Grieco, Karen Branch, Laurie Preston, Maggie Whelan, Marlin Simpson, Rocky and Sophia Rockwell, Susan Bowen, and Wailani O'Herlihy.

Cruising Corner—by Garry Kraft

A ditch bag - or abandon ship bag - is one of those things that you hope you've wasted money on. Just like car and boat insurance, as well as AAA and BoatUS towing, these are services that I hope to never employ. The same with a ditch bag. It's nice to have one, stored and ready to go, and anticipate never using it.

I've done quite a bit of boating over the years, sailed as far as Hawaii, down to Mexico on numerous occasions, and to our Channel Islands probably several hundred times by now. I still have my old, battered, reliable ditch bag that's been on my last 3 boats and thankfully it never had to provide its intended service. Whether you day sail, overnight to the islands, do long offshore fishing trips, or sail across the ocean, every one of us should have one packed, prepared, easily accessed, and ready to go.

Ditch bag. Precisely, what is it? Well, it is a brightly colored, soft-sided waterproof container that floats and contains emergency essentials. There is a variety of pre-packed ditch bags available for sale on Amazon or West Marine, and purchasing such a kit might provide a good start. I suggest that you evaluate the contents of such a bag based upon the kind of boating you do, and add and remove items accordingly. You should limit your emergency stash to deal with a basic question: "Besides my PFD, what would I need for an emergency in the water?"

Most of our boating is within 30 miles of shore. Here is a representative ditch kit:



Floating Flashlight w/AAA Batteries, Strobe Light

ACR Personal Locator Beacon and/or EPIRB

Floating VHF Radio with GPS/DSC-AAA Battery Pack

Replacement AAA Batteries

Mini First Aid Kit, Personal Rx, Motion Sickness Tablets

Leatherman Stainless Pocket Tool w/Scissors

Roll of Duct Tape

Zip Lock Freezer Baggies

Red Aerial Signal Flares, Handheld Smoke Flares, Dye Marker Kit

Chemical Glow Sticks, Signal Mirror, Waterproof Whistle, 3' X 3' Distress Flag

Extra Bottles of Drinking Water

Sunscreen, Extra Hats, Long-sleeved Shirts, Mylar Survival Blankets

Collapsible Mug

Pair of Reading Glasses, Pair of Cheap Sunglasses

50' Length of Cord

Large Zip Ties

Kitchen Sponges

Energy Bars, Emergency Rations

I have a Personal Locator Beacon attached to my PFD, a Garmin inReach Explorer, and I carry a satellite cell phone. If going offshore, I strongly advise having a life raft. For local boating, your dinghy can suffice until emergency services arrive.

My Google calendar reminds me every 6 months to open my ditch bag, replace the drinking water, recycle the batteries, eat the emergency rations and energy bars and replace with fresh.

Remember, your emergency ditch bag will do you no good if you can't reach it in a hurry, so keep it nearby at all times and don't leave port without it. Also, advisable to have a long lanyard attached to prevent this vital item from floating away!

Will see you out there.






