Anglers' Corner

Anglers' Club Info: Anglers' dues of \$10 for the 2022 fishing season are due before January 31, 2022. Please send in your Anglers' dues with your regular club dues billing. If you forgot and sent the CIYC dues in without your Anglers' dues, you can provide a SEPARATE check made out to "Channel Islands Yacht Club, Anglers" and put Anglers' Dues in the memo section of the check. Send it or bring it to the Club. Or you can pay through the CIYC Foreup billing system - watch for the announcements.

When you are a CIYC Anglers' Club member you can win \$50.00 if you bring in the biggest legal fish of the month. Marlin, sharks, rays, and tournament fish do not count. You can only win once a year, but as the Lotto people are fond of saying, "You can't win if you don't play."

Anglers' Club Big Fish rules:

- 1. Fish must be caught within 100 miles of Channel Islands Harbor
- 2. Marlin, sharks and rays are not to be considered as winners
- 3. Must be caught on rod and reel
- 4. Fish can be verified by any CIYC member (there is a scale available in the reception office)
- 5. Fisherperson must be a paid CIYC Anglers' Club member
- 6. Angler must bring the fish to the boat, can have help gaffing or netting
- 7. CIYC, PCYC or Channel Islands Sportfishing scales can be used, others if certified.
- 8. Tournament fish do not count except for the Big Fish of the Year
- 9. An angler can only win the Big Fish of the month one time a year

WSB Pens Update: Shortly after we took delivery of 10,000 juvenile White Seabass in October to the grow-out pens, we had our first heavy rain of the season which washed a lot of contaminants into the harbor. Within a few days we started to see an increase of mortalities in our fish; the morts had skin lesions. The hatchery folks came up and helped us treat the fish to a Hydrogen Peroxide bath on 3 consecutive days. This didn't help, and the mortalities kept increasing.

We lost approximately ½ of the 10K fish that were delivered.

We now are trying a course of medicated food that will last 10 days. Because of this, the mortality rate has been reduced drastically. However, if that doesn't stop it entirely, we may have to euthanize the remaining fish. We are not certain of the origins of the bacterial infection. It may have come from the hatchery and just took off because the immunity of the fish was compromised after transport and the change in water quality after the storm.

Reminder: Boat-based rock fish season ends December 31st, 2021 and doesn't reopen until March 1st, 2022! These species may only be taken or possessed in waters less than a 75-fathom depth contour (450 feet). The daily bag and possession limit is 10 fish in combination with all species within the RCG Complex. Yelloweye Rockfish, Bronze spotted Rockfish, and Cowcod may not be retained (bag limit: zero). There are exceptions, so check here: https://www.wildlife.ca.gov/Fishing/Ocean/Regulations/Groundfish-Summary#south to get the most current regulations!

At the yearly Anglers' Awards dinner, the Big Fish of the Year is awarded \$100. It does not have to be a fish submitted as a Big Fish of the Month to qualify, but it can be a tournament fish, so keep fishing!

Pig Kidney Transplant to Humans

In the US approximately 90,000 patients are awaiting a kidney transplant. For decades, doctors tried unsuccessfully to figure out how to transplant organs between different species and failed. This was due to severe hyper-acute rejection whereby the transplanted organ was destroyed within hours by the host's immune system.

Surgeons at NYU Langone Health successfully transplanted a pig kidney into a human for the first time without triggering a hyper-acute rejection by the recipient's immune system.

The procedure involved the use of a pig whose genes had been altered so that its tissues no longer contained a molecule known to trigger almost immediate rejection.

Dr. Robert Montgomery, who led the study, theorized with his team that knocking out one pig gene, which makes a carbohydrate that triggers rejection (a sugar molecule, or glycan, called alpha-gal) - would prevent the issue.



To do this, a pig embryo with one gene modified was implanted inside a surrogate sow by United Therapeutics Corp's Revivicor unit.

The sow then delivered a piglet with a modified immune system more compatible with humans.

Once an adult, the pig also had surgery to attach its thymus to its kidney. The thymus is a small gland which produces white blood cells and is located near the top of the lungs. Transplanting the pig thymus along with its kidney is aimed at reducing a person's long-term immune response to the foreign tissue. In theory, the patient's thymus would then be removed before transplant.

The genetically altered pig kidney was surgically connected to the blood vessels of a brain-dead patient who was about to be taken off a ventilator and other support systems. The patient also had kidney failure. The kidney was observed on the outside of the patient for three days.

There was no immediate rejection. The kidney resumed normal function for three days and the patient's markers, such as creatinine, fell to normal values.

Other scientists using the same model are researching if other organs such as heart, liver, and pancreas could also be transplanted into humans. Pigs' heart valves have been in use on humans for a long time.

This successful first kidney transplant offers great hope. Within two years other critically ill patients who cannot tolerate dialysis may be given the opportunity to receive a pig kidney transplant. It is likely other problems may show up and have to be resolved, but this is a giant first step. Very exciting!

The complete policy will be posted in the club for your convenience.

We are pleased to report that on most Friday nights we will provide a light meal unless there's a conflict with another club event. Our Committee has assumed responsibility for stocking hot dog provisions and finding volunteers to provide these Friday meals. We have most Fridays covered. When you see these Friday volunteers, please say thanks! If you're interested in helping prepare one of these meals, please contact Diane Sabol. It's a great way to learn how to prepare and present club meals.

The Friday light fare will include soup, sandwich, salad, etc for \$7.00.

Reservation Procedures

Making a Reservation

Email alerts sent to the membership will inform members to please make their reservations at least 48 hours before the event and will include a link to

reservations.civc@roadrunner.com

You should receive a confirmation of your reservation within 24 hours of requesting it. Please watch for this confirmation. If you don't receive a confirmation, something went wrong. Assume you do not have a reservation.

Your return email will indicate a confirmation of your reservation or whether the event is sold out, in which case you'll be placed on a wait list. You will be notified if there are cancelations, or if additional places open up.

Checking in for a Meal With a Reservation

There is usually someone designated to check members and guests in for events (Janis Pulliam or another member) - usually in the barroom. If not, the bartenders will handle the check-in of members.

If you are on the reservation list, you will be given a ticket or wristband, and your account will be charged for the event.

Walk-ins

Members may show up at an event without a reservation and take the chance that there will be space or that some members don't show up.

Canceling a Reservation

If you need to cancel a reservation, please email reservations.ciyc@roadrunner.com. If you cancel less than 24 hours in advance of an event, you will be charged for the event unless the club can sell the reservation to someone else.

If you do not show up and do not cancel, you will be charged for the event.

Checking in Without a Reservation

If you don't have a reservation, still ask the person checking people in. If there's space available, you will be checked in. If there is a wait list, you can decide if you want to be added to it.

Bar Food

When there is no other meal offered, there will be food in the bar.

On Thursdays and Sundays this will typically be \$4.00 for a hot dog & bag of chips. Limited condiments will be available.

CIYC Bar Food is offered on the honor system,

Friday nights will generally feature a light meal such as soup & sandwich or our salad bar for \$7.00 (unless there's a conflict with another club event).

Please see our bartenders to pay and get a plate. If a salad bar is offered, Janis will sell the plates in the barroom or TV room.

Bar food will be available on a first come, first served basis.

Channel Islands Harbor Watch

Harbor and Beach Communities Will Remain in One County District

The Ventura County Board of Supervisors has recognized Channel Islands Harbor and surrounding beach neighborhoods within the boundaries of Fifth Street to the north, Victoria Avenue in the southeast, and the Pacific Ocean to the west, including the entire Silver Strand area, as a "community of common interest." This means redistricting will keep these neighborhood areas within a single County District. The Board voted to move forward with one redistricting map (#82647 on the County's Redistricting site). This map keeps the harbor community within its current district, District 5. Based upon their meeting in which the five County Supervisors discussed the issue, this map appears to be very close to being approved. There will be one final public meeting on December 7th when some modifications may be proposed and considered, but a final redistricting map must be legally decided on by December 15, 2021.

Coming Up - Redistricting of Oxnard's City Council Districts

Redistricting of the City of Oxnard's Council Districts will be subject to the same legal requirements as the County's. Those requirements are listed on the City's redistricting website.

The City's redistricting process will determine the Council District that will represent the harbor communities. It is critical that the harbor and beach communities participate in this process to ensure their effective representation.

The City of Oxnard will be holding public redistricting meetings on the following dates:

Monday, December 6, 2021 Thursday, January 6, 2022 Saturday, January 22, 2022 Tuesday, February 1, 2022 Wednesday, February 16, 2022 SAVE THE DATE DEC 4th 2021 Food & Toy Drive

The City's redistricting process must be completed by April 17, 2022.






