

Coastal Knowledge

Hello **Boaters** and Waterfront Lovers

WEATHER:

Great winter conditions have prevailed. Seas have been calm and our high Santa Ana offshore winds are starting to diminish. The past 5 months have been great.

The next 4 months should be medium to strong NW until July. I consider March 1, the end of our boating season. While we will experience sunny weather on shore with gentle winds in the mornings, winds offshore will be 15-25 knots most days.

This is when a lot of new boaters miscalculate sea conditions and venture out only using the conditions in which they observe at their slip, only to have a bad boating experience and losing interest. I would say half the new boaters experience this and quit boating. To avoid this, one simply needs to look very closely at the local conditions such as wind reports offshore, swell height and distance between swells.

An example of a bad report will be 20 to 30 knot winds NW at Point Conception 4-6 foot seas at 6 to 10 seconds apart and the East Channel Buoy 8-12 knot winds NW with 2-4 foot seas at 6 seconds apart. While the winds are relatively calm at 8-12 knots the swells are close together. There really is not any direction or speed that will escape the discomfort you encounter. The only relief will be inside the breakwater. An example of a fair day will be 8-10 knots at Point Conception with 1 to 3 foot swells at 10-14 seconds apart and 1-2 foot

seas 12 plus seconds apart. Be very wise and if the seas are questionable simply have a wonderful harbor cruise and enjoy your boat dockside.

FISHING

I have been thinking about how much the change I have seen in the local and island fish population decrease over the past 45 years and what if anything can change the future reduction. I do not think there is one fisherman like myself that is not guilty of wasting fish he has taken whether it be method of release, deadly terminal tackle or simply putting his fresh fish in the freezer with good intentions of eating his catch at a later date only to find it freezer burnt beyond saving 6 months later. Figure it out: say five thousand fisherman fish the waters and half have weighed 5 fish for the season, this is 1250 fish.

My suggestion is, if we, the fishermen, would reduce to a personal take, limit to 1/2 the legal limit for fish with a 2 fish or more legal possession. I think this should apply to shellfish and lobsters. I recently went clamming, 4 days in one week, limiting out each day for a grand total of 40 clams. Yes, I was able to spread them out to friends but later felt I had strained the resource beyond my share and probably should consider my actions and make a correction, if my grandchildren will ever be able to go clamming with their children. This is when I came up with the personal 1/2 limit rule which I'm going to commit.

The final day with two races left, found the fleet a little depleted as Dennis (Connor) West wasn't able to race and so the CIYC mantle was picked up by Richard and Paula Sharpe on *Perfect Balance* (aided by our secret weapon, Bill Brayton doing a fine job of trimming). They needed two wins to carry the series for the club.

The weather was still changeable and playing the wind shifts was vital. But needing two wins, *Perfect Balance* didn't have much room for error. Expert helming by Eric Beck saw our boat home to win the regatta for CIYC. The trophy will sit in our display case for the next year.

HELP WANTED

Channel Islands Harbor White Seabass Grow-Out Facility

The United Anglers Seabass Committee is the organization that has volunteers monitoring the 14 seabass grow-out facilities throughout Southern California. One grow-out facility was first established in 1992, in the Channel Islands Harbor, which is the continuing work started by Bud Smith and Jimmy Donlan, a member of the United Anglers of Southern California. As closely as we can ascertain, the first batch of white Seabass was released about April 1993. In April of 2003 one of these fish was caught at Catalina.

Presently, Web Palmquist and George Arglen are the Channel Islands Harbor representatives to Hubbs-Sea World Research Institute in conjunction with the Leon Hubbard Marine Fish Hatchery in Carlsbad, California.

The institute provides us with fingerlings, nets, fish feeders, food, medical assistance (if required) through the State of California Fish and Game Department, at no cost.

Channel Islands Harbor provides a docking facility for our fish pens, electricity, and storage facility, for which we thank the Harbor Department and their community service.

Our current volunteer staff consists of: Web Palmquist, George Arglen, Bob Deyling, Dick Olsen, Bill Coltrin, Frank Sullivan, and Wade Ambrose. Each volunteer has one day in which to check on the feed, register temperatures of the water, make daily entries in the log (that are required by Hobbs Institute for reporting any mortalities and any signs of any illness), and assure the security of the fish pens. When the white Seabass get to about 11-12 inches in size, they are counted and released into the harbor, and most of them make their way out to sea. This requires all hands as well as additional volunteers. Additionally, from time to time, the nets need care and the pens need maintenance, for which all volunteers come together to perform.

This project has never been a CIYC project, however, due to both Palmquist and

Arglen being members of CIYC, they sought the help of fellow members within the club.

We would like, at this time, to recruit ONE more CIYC member to help with this project. This would entail a <u>Saturday or a Sunday</u> duty; i.e. feed, register temperatures of the water, make entries in the log and report mortality or illness

in the fish. This duty calls for not more than 30 minutes for the one day of the week. The day can be picked to accommodate your schedule. If you are interested please call **George Arglen at 805-985-6036.**

It is a fulfilling experience and is a community service.

No Big fish were turned in for February. The weather has not been conductive to the hunt and with rockfish closed until March 1st, there was little to fall back on. Many reports are coming in on squid at the islands. All we need is a weather window and for the white seabass to go on the chew.

WSB pen update:

The cormorant problem has been resolved. A diver was dispatched and found a hole in the interior net were these birds were swimming through.

We've had a significant die-off in the last few weeks because of disease. Hubbs SeaWorld sent up a veterinary team to treat the fish in pens 1& 2, the fish in pen 3 were released. We counted 7,578 whites of about 10 to 12 inches long.

Saturday March 10th 7PM, Skip Miser presents the Annual Anglers Lobster Dinner.

The first Anglers meeting of the year will take place on <u>Thursday night</u> <u>March 15th</u>. The speaker will be Captain John Fuqua, the captain of the sport boat *Sea Jay*. He will be talking about fishing for white seabass for both private and sport boat fishermen.

Boating Safety

With spring and boating season just around the corner, boaters should think about things to help them stay safe all year long.

One of the best gift ideas for boaters is to sign them up for a boating safety course. Knowledge is power, and it has been statistically shown that boaters who have taken a safety class are far less likely to be involved in a boating mishap or fatality. Course topics include basic boat handling, required and recommended safety equipment, navigational rules and dealing with boating emergencies. One of the most valuable items for boaters doesn't cost anything but time, such as scheduling a free vessel safety check (VSC) with the local Coast Guard Auxiliary or Power Squadron. A trained member will examine your vessel to ensure compliance with federal, state and local safety requirements before getting underway, and then issue a decal of compliance. For more information or to schedule a VSC, visit: http://safetyseal.net/ and click on "I WANT A VSC." Click on the VIRTUAL VSC button to take a walk through of the exam to prepare your vessel to successfully pass the exam. Remember that a failure of the VSC does not result in a citation. A boarding by the USCG will if you are found deficient in any equipment.

Ten other great gift ideas to help keep boaters safe include:

Sleek, light-weight, and comfortable inflatable life jackets (personal flotation devices - PFDs)

A carbon monoxide detector

Emergency signaling kits -- flares, signal mirror, whistle, etc.

Kill switch leash -- kills the engine if the boater falls overboard

Up-to-date navigational charts and/or a handheld GPS unit

Navigation tools and calculators

Hand-held VHF marine radio with extra batteries

Personal emergency position indicating radio beacons (PEPIRBs)

Tool kit and spare parts for boats

Personal protective Equipment (PPE), such as a First Aid kit, sun screen, sunglasses, food and water.
