Big Fish of the month

Skip Miser took **Dick Olsen** and **Dave Erickson** out fishing on the <u>Dawn Patrol</u> May 21st and got into a nice Halibut bite at Santa Cruz Island. **Dick** caught a couple of nice fish a **14lb 8oz Halibut and a 6lb Halibut**, **Dave** however won **the big fish of the month with a 45lb 7oz Barn Door Halibut!!**

WSB Pen Update:

Tuesday May 3rd, from about 4pm until 11pm, Dick Olsen, myself, James Murdick from Hubs, Dave Wardlow; Don Dickey for a short while, Hilal Helweh and a friend of Hilal's in the early afternoon, worked on releasing the fish in the WSB grow out pens. We pulled and cleaned the empty #2 net first and hung it to dry. Then we waited until after dark and cut the side of pen #1 that had the fish in it. We did this at the turn of the tide hoping the fish would simply swim out. No dice, so we tried to crowd them out, some left only to swim right back in! Hoping for better results, we dropped the interior net and pulled it up onto the deck leaving the fish with only the large opening, predator net around them. It was dark but could see that there were many fish still hanging around inside the predator nets instead of heading out through the larger openings. We tried crowding them out to no avail.

The next morning we came down to clean and remove the interior net that was pulled up onto the deck. This turned out to be a long, onerous task with only Dick Olsen, myself and James Murdick from Hubbs in the morning. Then and Cary, Don Hummer, and Bob Ridenour came to help us in the afternoon. We cleaned literally a ton of mussels and other biological from the net before it could be taken up to the truck in the parking lot. We have no idea why this pen was more fouled that pen #2.

While we were there a friend of Hilal's came by in his boat. He is a diver, so he dove down on the outside of the net. He said the reason the fish were not leaving was probably because the predator net was also so full of mussels that the fish could only see a wall. So we had him drop the outside net along the harbor side of the pens and **eventually all the fish left.**

<u>Thanks to all who helped</u>, the next load of fish will probably be in June or July. The Harbor Department has moved the pens to the end of the docks adjacent to the old launch ramp. After that is done we will have to remove the predator net and probably drag it up the old launch ramp so we can clean it of the growth. I will be putting out a call for help to do it soon.

Records I have researched indicate this will be the first entry in our club history to fly our burgee. Ram member boat owner Phil Sauer: Skipper Ram member Harry Krum, Ram member Don Hummer, Ram member John Alain, Curt and Mary Howard Ingram and Graham Paine regular members along with others that have raced on Channel Islands boats not members will be the team. This accomplished team is setting the example of team work, sportsmanship and accomplished sailing. This is what our Yacht Club stands for: Needless to say this is a costly venture, we hope in the very near future to sponsor a kick off fund raiser for our team. We are open to suggestions and look forward to the support.

A Brief History of the Transpacific Yacht Race

With 44 races starting in 1906, the Transpacific Yacht Race to Hawaii is well into its second century as the longest of the two oldest ocean races in the world. The first race was the year of the great San Francisco earthquake, which literally altered the course of the event.

The race was inspired by King Kalakaua, the revered Hawaiian leader of the late 19th century who believed that such an event would strengthen the islands' economic and cultural ties to the mainland. But it didn't happen until Clarence MacFarlane, a Honolulu racing sailor, invited several contemporaries in San Francisco and Los Angeles to race to the Hawaiian Islands. The race was scheduled to start in the early summer of 1906, but when MacFarlane sailed his 48-foot schooner into San Francisco Bay he realized there would have to be a change of plans. The city lay in ruins following the great earthquake 27 days earlier.

But MacFarlane wasn't easily discouraged. He simply changed the starting point to Los Angeles, and except for one nostalgic return to San Francisco for the start in 1939, the race has started in Southern California ever since. The starting line is now off the bluffs of Point Fermin in San Pedro at the southern edge of the City of Los Angeles. The finish is off the Diamond Head lighthouse just east of Honolulu, establishing a distance of 2,225 nautical miles.

The fastest in the fleet have traditionally competed for the Transpacific Yacht Club Perpetual Trophy, which is better known as the "Barn Door" for its unique size. It is a 3 1/2 x 4-foot plaque of hand-carved Hawaiian koa wood bearing the words "FIRST TO FINISH," which isn't necessarily so anymore. Since 1991 the starts have been staggered. The slower boats start a few days ahead of the faster boats in order to compress the finishes and facilitate celebrations in Hawaii, and occasionally one will finish before the later, faster starters. Thus, the Barn Door goes to the monohull (multihulls aren't eligible) with the fastest elapsed time.

Smaller and/or slower boats unable to match the largest ones in sheer speed compete for a prize more relevant to crew performance: the King Kalakaua perpetual trophy for the best corrected handicap time. Each boat's speed potential is calculated from a rating system based on time and distance, rewarding the crew that sailed its boat nearest to its potential, regardless of size. The winner also receives the takehome Governor of Hawaii trophy, a hand-carved model of a Hawaiian sailing canoe. Transpac stands apart from other major ocean races as essentially a "downwind" race, as determined by normal

weather patterns in the eastern Pacific north of the equator. But the most successful boats seldom sail a straight line to Hawaii, instead taking a southerly course to avoid the "Pacific High," a mammoth, ever-shifting region of high pressure (and thus light winds) rotating clockwise between Hawaii and the West Coast of North America. After two or three days of sailing against the wind, they come into the warm, following trade winds. Spinnakers go up, layers come off, and sailors traditionally enjoy a faster and more pleasant ride the rest of the way.

The Channel Islands Yacht Club BOB COOKE Memorial double handed race will take place on Saturday June 4th. Race Committee Ram member Tim Haapanen will again be the committee boat. Ram member Bill Brayton will be the PRO. This race will start at Mandalay Buoy and end in front of the Channel Islands Yacht Club. Come on by for fun and welcome home the racers and cheer them on and witness the awards. Kelly Warshauer, wife of RAM member Tom Warshauer of the vessel Quiet Times will prepare the food for the hungry racers.

The Channel Islands Yacht Club JOHN LARSON Memorial sponsored by Betty Larson and the daughter of John and Betty, Debra Tyhurst will take place June 12th. John had set many records and led an accomplished life of sailing and racing. We remember John as he sat at the corner stool; there is a plaque on the bar where he sat. Again please be there to welcome our racers and join in the fun.

Debra and Rick Tyhurst watch the boat they loved HEATHEN which originally belonged to Ram Member Dan Alpern, coming back to racing. When Debra and Rick supported Mike Turner along with his young son Justin by turning HEATHEN over to them they must have had a vision. The first entry for the Turners was The Port Royal and they completed all races in the regatta. The first race of the series Anacapa to Port Race sponsored by Anacapa Yacht Club was held May 21, and yes HEATHEN was entered. This kind of reminds us of the children's story the little train that was. We have our own little boat that was. HEATHEN is a 20 foot Santana and she is out there with the big guys.

2011 BRISTOL BOAT AWARDS

On opening day, April 3, 2011, Fleet Captain Jane Thomas announced winners of the Bristol Boat competition for sailboats over 35 feet, sailboats under 35 feet, and power boats over 35 feet and under 35 feet.

Bristol Boats are judged on their condition, equipment, and safety issues. The judging was performed by Fleet Captain Jane Thomas and Tom Warden, a former Bristol Boat winner.

Tom and Kelly Warshauer won the <u>under 35 foot sailboat</u> category, with their Catalina 38 sailboat, "Quiet Times". Tom Warshauer is a frequent participant in sailboat races throughout the year and has won several trophies as a racer.

Past Commodore, Tom Naylor, won the <u>under 35 foot sailboat</u> category with his Lancer power sailor, "Shady Lady". Tom has won Bristol Boat awards in the past with "Shady Lady" in 1996, 1997 and 2003.

A newcomer in the <u>power boat arena</u> is **Tim Haapanen**, with his 35 foot trawler, "**Marika**". Tim has done an outstanding job in restoring this trawler which is now being used as our committee boat for sailboat races. Previously, Tim won the Bristol Boat award for his famous sailboat, "**Sisu**", a 27 foot Catalina, in 2008, 2009, and 2010.

Tim Haapanen is also one of the most accomplished sailboat racers in Ventura County. In 2003, he won first place for the Wet Wednesday Season with the Anacapa Yacht Club.

In 2009, he was distinguished by becoming the 2009 High Point Champion for the ASBCYC (Association of Santa Barbara Channel Yacht Clubs). In 2009, he also was the Ventura County High Point Champion. Tim has been informed no one previously has won both of these trophies in the same year.

Tim is the <u>only CIYC club member that has ever won Bristol Boat</u> awards in both the sailboat and power boat categories during the existence of our club, a period of over 51 years!

Take the Search out of Search and Rescue Upgrade to GPS enhanced EPIRBs

When Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacons (EPIRB) are activated in emergency situations the system transmits vessel identification information to rescuers. Traditional EPIRBs rely on satellite Doppler Shift to identify the distress location. There are a wide variety of Coast Guard approved EPIRBs on the market but many do not have the most up-to-date feature: the ability to transmit the EPIRB's GPS location.

Several recent casualty investigations have revealed that EPIRB owners are largely unaware that rescue efforts are significantly improved and your vessel's location transmitted more quickly and accurately when distress signals are initiated by *GPS enhanced EPIRBs*. GPS enhanced EPIRBs normally save 30 to 100 minutes in obtaining an accurate location. This is a significant amount of time and may mean the difference between life or death in cold water situations where the survival rate is decreased as each minute passes. New GPS enhanced EPIRBs provide a location accurate within 100 meters in 50 to 120 seconds. The GPS enhanced EPIRB not only alerts immediately, but also directs rescuers to a more exact location, allowing helicopter flight time to be devoted to rescue operations rather than conducting search operations.

An illustration of the effectiveness of GPS enhanced EPIRBs was the March 23, 2008 sinking of the F/V ALASKA RANGER in the Bering Sea 120 miles west of Dutch Harbor with 47 people on board. The vessel's Category I EPIRB was not enhanced with GPS which resulted in a delay in analyzing the data. In contrast, a personal EPIRB carried by a fisheries observer on board was outfitted with GPS, and it took only 11 minutes to identify that EPIRB's distress location. Fortunately a distress call was also made using the single side-band radio and rescuers immediately responded.

Since May 30th 2008, the Commercial Fishing Safety Advisory Committee has recommended that all new EPIRBs installed onboard commercial fishing vessels include an integral GPS receiver to permit automatic inclusion of position in the distress alert.

The National Transportation Safety Board in their recent Marine Accident Brief on the sinking of the commercial fishing vessel LADY MARY recommended to the Federal Communication Commission that for commercial vessels required to carry 406-MHz EPIRBs, those EPIRBs be required to broadcast vessel position data when activated.

The Coast Guard **strongly urges** vessel Owner/Operators to <u>replace and upgrade existing EPIRBs</u> <u>with GPS enhanced EPIRBs.</u>




finally retrieved for the sake of the dinner.

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
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
